A GOLDEN MERCHANT DEAD.—Robert Lang died at Golden on Tuesday last, after an illness of several months. Mr. Lang was born at Langside, Durham county, Ontario, 64 years ago, and resided in that province until he came to Golden in 1854. For several years he was engaged in the milling business at Lindsay. Since coming to Golden he successfully carried on general merchandising, and always bore the reputation of being a conscientious, honorable business man. The remains were interred at Golden on Wednesday, sheriff Hodgson, J. C. Green, A. F. Cummins, John O'Hara, J. W. Conner, and H. H. Moody acting as pall-bearers. Rev. Mr. Wright of Dundas held religious services at the church, and read the Episcopal burial service at the grave. The funeral was largely attended.—Donald, B. C. "Truth," April 6th.

ANOTHER NORTHERN RAILWAY LINE.—The garden of the north country lies in Minden, Lettsworth, Anson, Hildes, Stanbury, Sherburne, Melan, Ridon, and Brunel. In each are large quantities of timber, minerals, and much excellent farming land, that should and will afford happy homes for thousands. From Messrs. M. Brown and W. Herle of Minden, two very worthy gentlemen, we learn the route we formerly proposed for the line to Saint Ste Marie's, from Oshler through Minden and onward towards Huntville, via either Riperville at the south west, or Cole bridge at the east of Trading Lake, or Lake of the, in one over which a railway could be constructed with ease, and without much expense. A grand district would be opened up and not touched by any railway. We suggest that a local company be organized at once, and arrangements perfected for carrying out the project. Plans should be completed this summer. Mills on Gull, Black, and Upper Muskeoke waters should be made to afford traffic to a railway; while soon, a settlement would give ample produce and passengers to pay.

LINDSAY WATER WORKS.—We are pleased to learn that steps are being taken to have a complete system of water supply established in our town, both for domestic and all commercial purposes. As has been intimated in last week's issue, Mr. Freeman of Watertown, N. Y., made a prospective survey of the town and as well as a searching examination of the various sources of water supply. He was gratified to find the water in Scugog river, a point known as the Devil's Elbow, to be most excellent for domestic purposes and of unlimited supply. We, as citizens, would be pleased to have such a system established in our town by a competent water company, such as the Moffett, Hodgins & Clark Co., who are represented by Mr. Freeman, their travelling manager. At his request, members of the Town Clerk's office, the Bazaar House, and the Simpson House, which speak for themselves. This enterprise would prove a great boon to the citizens owing to the convenience and confidence it would afford them. Constant and severe laws would be one of the live attractions of the residence portion. The existence of a good system would prove a very strong attraction to our manufacturing public; it would stimulate the growth of the town; it would enhance the value of property; and would reduce the heavy insurances imposed on our property holders. There seems to be a general impression that the Scugog river water is very highly contaminated; but we are informed otherwise by competent and experienced authority. The presence of an ordinary per centage of vegetable matter in the Scugog river water does not make it unfit for domestic purposes, on the contrary the vegetable matter present in the water serves a grand purpose, in the fact that it absorbs any poisonous germs that the water may contain. It has a great affinity for animal matter, which is a most poisonous element. We are frequently told that our former friends are given to depositing the remains of dead animals in the stream; perhaps they are ignorant of the fact, that there is an act of the Statute of Ontario, prohibiting such deposits and in case of conviction of the violation of the law are subject to a very heavy penalty. This law the Moffett, Hodgins & Clark Water Works Co., would have rigidly enforced. Mr. Freeman claims that to supply the town with wholesome water would mean death to their system. They have given complete satisfaction in all of the 10 systems which they have now and operate, and must be given entire confidence in all future systems they may construct. We hope that Mr. Freeman will give us another visit in the near future and determine upon constructing a system of water works this season.
