SIE, -- In THE WARDER of the 19th inst., in an editorial entitled "The Presbyterians," the following sentence occurs:—"Rev. Dr. Caven and many other life-long reformers have struck out from the shoulder, and are bent on cleaning out not only the Quebec stable, but also Ontario." The reference is
