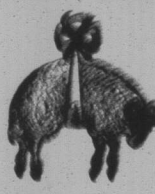

THE BRIDGES ARE SAFE.—Many enquiries are made regarding the safety of the bridges between Omsen and Peterboro. They are perfectly safe. The fact is that every day daily freight trains laden with coal and equal timber cross them, should satisfy the most timid of their stability. The number of cars that could be placed on each bridge would be more than four times as heavy as the weight of passenger coaches filled with people would be. In short, a freight train would weigh from 900,000 to one million pounds, while the longest passenger train laden would not go beyond four hundred thousand pounds. Moreover the beams, or pieces of the bridge are only sixteen feet apart, thus a coach would always be over three and possibly four pieces at once. Further, every day there is a careful examination by skilled men of every part of each bridge. Those advancing the argument of the bridges being "weak," are hard up for a cry to prevent Oranmen coming to Lindsay. It is understood that before the crossing of any passenger train, much more large excursion trains the bridges are carefully examined, but they are as safe as any other part of the line. But we have written Chief Engineer Macklin, requesting that extra precaution be observed on the 12th July.
