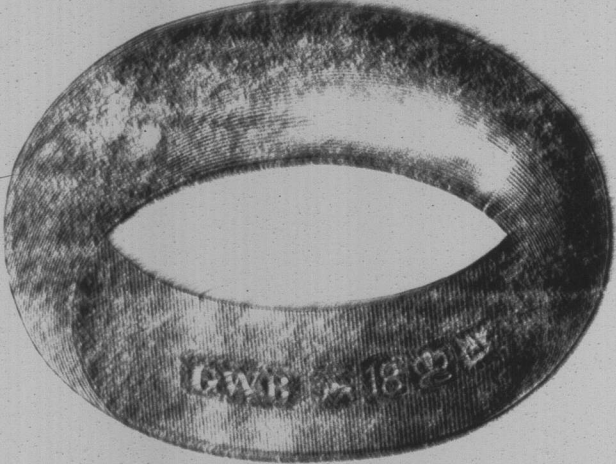

CUT IN TWAIN.—Another terrible fatality occurred Monday night last on the Midland Railway by which another brokenman met a terrible death. Alfred Jones was the victim's name and a fine, industrious man the victim is said to have been. The accident occurred just a short distance out of Port Hope, on an auxiliary train which had been sent out to repair the track near Gordon Hill yesterday afternoon. Jones was a brakeman on the freight train on which the break down occurred and was running into Port Hope as a passenger on the auxiliary. His van was next to the engine and with his mate he was proceeding towards the van when he met his death. The auxiliary car which is next to the van, had no platform, the door in the end opening right into the bumper. Forgetting this Jones stepped out expecting to find a platform, but instead went down between the cars and fell across the rails. Fourteen cars passed over his body, cutting it completely in two and severing one of his arms. Death came about 25 years of age and just at Sydney, but was running out of Lindsay on the Midland. He was a member of the Sons of England, who took charge of the body at Port Hope.—Peterboro Review.
