EXPLOSION.—Shortly before six o'clock yesterday morning a loud report which was heard all over the town, alarmed the citizens. It was soon ascertained that the boiler in Dovey's Shingle Mill on the east side of the river, north of Wellington-st. bridge, had exploded, killing the engineer, George Pugh, and causing a boiler and machinery, were torn into fragments, and parts of them thrown to a great distance. An idea of the force of the explosion may be formed from the fact that the dome of the boiler, weighing about 500 lbs, was hurled over the river and deposited on William-st., a distance of fully 1000 feet. The plate also in the unoccupied store lately occupied by J. Simmons, on Kent-st., as was also the one in Kaye's; only one, fully half a mile away, were broken. The cause of the accident is supposed to be low water in the boiler, although it is stated by a son of the unfortunate man who lost his life, that his father filled the boiler the night before previous to leaving work. Had the accident occurred fifteen minutes later, the loss of life would undoubtedly have been greater, as the full number of hands employed, twelve, would have been at their getting-up steam, preparatory to starting.
