"Up till 1885 we lived in peace with our countrymen of other beliefs and of other origin. Harmony reigned among us, and we advanced rapidly towards the consolidation of the diverse elements which exists in this country. But in 1885 the Riel agitation, the fiery speeches of Mr. Mercier, the formation of the Nationalist party the arousing of an ultra-French, and ultra Quebec sentiment, these are the sources of the disease, the causes of the crisis which rage to day. Ontario warned us of this at the time. They told us that exaggerations called forth exaggerations; that fanaticism awakened fanaticism.
