It is not supposable that there is concerted action among the hangmen to make their avocation unpopular, but the horrible blunders at recent executions have certainly served the avocation unpopular, but the horrible blunders at recent executions have certainly served the purpose of increasing public antipathy to capital punishment upon the gallows. Who can read the report of the hanging at Guelph, Ont., Friday, without an involuntary shudder and a denunciation of the barbarism made possible by legal ensemble? The poor wretch must have suffered agonies indescribable. The weight which lifted the body was not heavy enough, the scaffold was not high enough, the knot in the rope shyped, and as a consequence the struggling victim of a series of binnders was slowly strangled to death. It is but enough when everything works smoothly and the neck of the condemned is in accumulation of horrors.

It is not to be wondered at that advocates of electricity as a means of death punishment emphasizs barbarous scenes similar to those enected at Guelph, and everyone must be impressed with the belief that if hanging is to endure it should be better managed. Under the present law, the first change demanded, evidently enough, is the employment of sheriffs who have sufficient intelligence and interest in the matter to provide the proper appliances but for some reason yet to be excludined, too many of the executions are made needlessly revolting by the carelessness of the law's officers, and, strangely enough, neither the public nor those individuals seem to think for a moment that they are blameworthy. —Rochester Democrat and Chronicle.
