Laws Regarding Newspapers. 1st.—Any person who takes a paper regularly from the post-office, whether directed to his name or another's, or whether he has subscribed or not, is responsible for the payment. 2nd.—If a person orders his paper to be discontinued, he must pay all arrearages, or the publisher may continue to send it until payment is made, and then collect the whole amount, whether the paper is taken from the office or not. 3rd.—If subscribers neglect or refuse to take the periodicals or newspapers from the office to which they are directed, they are held responsible until they have settled their bills. Sending numbers back, or leaving them in the office, is not such notice as the law requires. 4th.—The Courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers or periodicals from the post-office, or removing and leaving them uncollected for, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud.
