Laws Regarding Newspapers.  
1st—Any person who takes a paper regu-  
larly from the post-office, whether direct-  
ly to his name or another's, or whether he  
has subscribed or not, is responsible for the  
payment.  
2nd—If a person orders his paper to be  
discontinued, he must pay all arrearages,  
or the publisher may continue to send it un-  
til payment is made, and then collect the  
whole amount, whether the paper is taken  
from the office or not.  
3rd—If subscribers neglect or refuse to  
take the periodicals or newspapers from the  
office to which they are directed, they are  
held responsible until they have settled their  
bill. Sending notices back, or leaving them  
in the office, is not such notice as the law  
requires.  
4th—The Courts have decided that re-  
fusing to take newspapers or periodicals  
from the post-office, or removing and leaving  
them unclaimed, is, in prima facie evidence of  
intentional fraud.
