### The Bay of Fundy Tides.

LOSSES TO THE AMOUNT OF \$30,000 EN-

SACKVILLE, N. B., Aug. 12 .- The damage to the hay crop and pasture marsh by the late high tides is estimated by some at \$20,000, and by others at \$60,000. Probably \$30,000 will cover all the losses. Several repaired places in the dykes on the ramparture marsh were washed out by last night's tide. It is impossible to keep the water out, and the farmers are very much excited in consequence. All the hay down will be ruined, and the rest is more or less damaged. Grain on the marshes will be spoiled. In some places the road has been washed on the marsh, and the grass holds so much grit that it will be almost impossible to cut. The destruction to gras hoppers is something immense. Every piece of board that is floating is black with these insects, and every rail fence standing is covered.
