A Brilliant Failure. Electric lighting has shared the same fate in Edinburgh as in Liverpool. It has been a failure. After having been in use for four months—the last month at a reduced rate—the lamps in Princess street and the North and Waverly bridges have been extinguished, and the contract with the Anglo-American Brush Company has been allowed to lapse. The reason of this is partly the that they advised the assignee to hand costliness of the new light and partly disappointment with the practical result of the lighting. The light was brilliant enough in the immediate neighbourhood of each lamp, but it was not sufficiently diffused over the intervening spaces. This defect would have been remedied by increasing the number of lamps and diminishing the distance between them; but that would have increased the cost, and the Town Council was not prepared to face that.

On the 27th ult. the members of the county council, accompanied by a lew of the residents of Lindsay, came to the Falls in a special train for the purpose of viewing the new iron bridge; and, having done so, unanimously decided that it would have to be raised nearly or quite two feet. We are informed and no doubt correctly, that the sum asked by the bridge company is \$700 and, even if this includes the additional masonry, the price appears so high that there is some talk of advertising for tenders, as many believe that the job could be done for half the money. We hope, however, that there will no attempt to follow up, in this case, the " penny wise and pound foolish" policy to which our authorities are too much addicted. The work of raising the bridge will, we think, be found to require special knowledge, as well as special mechanical appliances, and if an accident should happen to the structure during its upward progress a very seri-Savings Department ous loss might be entailed unless the company have the contract, and their skilled employees would be much more likely to foresee and prevent mishaps than persons inexperienced in the particular work. It is bad enough to have to pay \$700 extra in consequence of a want of thoughtfulness on the part of the committee; but any attempt to lessen the penalty is very likely to lead to its being increased. There is one comforting thing about the bridge bungle, and that is that only a small portion of the loss occasioned thereby will have to
