Out of 100 storm-centers noted during velocity varies from 20 to 50 miles per hour so that either storm-centers or cold waves travel from the mountains to the sea in from two to five days, then passing off upon the ocean, frequently taking a north-easterly dia storm may be deflected from its course, or spend its force midway, or increase in sever ity, as it moves eastward.
