Of the 1 061 persons committed to prison in Massachusetts last year, only about eighteen per cent, were women. Another terribly violent cyclone oc-

curred near Pennsville, Pa., on Thursday night. Numerous lives were lost and a great amount of property destroyed.

A harbor without land seems an impossibility, yet something of the sort really exists in the gulf of Mexico. A kind of oil rises to the surface, where it forms a scum, and has the effect of keeping the water smooth in the severest storms. The spot is fifteen miles from shore, and on the approach of a storm small vessels scud to this "oil pond " for safety.

News comes from Hanover, Grey Co., of the discovery of the body of William Miller, a Bentinck Township farmer, in the woods about a mile from his house on Sunday afternoon. The murdered man had been shot at close quarters. and also beaten severely, and the body had evidently been placed where found after the murder, as there was no trace of a struggle in the vicinity.
