TO THE ELECTORS

South Riding OF THE COUNTY OF VICTORIA.

GENTLEMEN,— Having been nominated as the candidate for the Liberal Conservative interest by the Convention held at Lindsay on the twenty-fifth inst., I have accepted the position of standard bearer for the party at the approaching election.

From 1874 to 1878 the country was greatly depressed. Employment for workmen and mechanics was scarce, wages low, general trade in a very bad condition, and the Government in power acknowledged itself powerless.

Matters had got into the worst possible position when the present Government came into power, and at once commenced to grapple with the difficulties. Sir John Macdonald then inaugurated the National Policy. It was then unknown, untried. It is now become well known, well tried, and, although in its infancy, has surpassed the expectations of its most sanguine supporters; the result to-day being general prosperity.

While this Policy was being prepared and under discussion in Parliament it received the strongest possible opposition from the Reform party. No terms were too strong to use against it, and ever since misrepresentation and abuse have been heaped upon it. Even after its good effects began to be felt and appreciated the same opposition was evinced. But, finally, the improved state of the country was so great it could no longer be explained away or denied, and we find at present most of the opposition withdrawn and the National Policy triumphant.

I consider, therefore, the approaching elections of the greatest consequence to the people of the Dominion. The question now before the Electors to decide is simply this,—Shall the Government which brought about this happy state of affairs be driven from office, and those who persistently and violently opposed them put in their places?

I believe a majority will agree with us that it would not only be ungenerous and unfair but a calamity to the country. I consider the policy of the present Government in the rapid construction of the Pacific Railway, and the impetus given to the development of our great North-West Territory, is worthy of endorsement.

We have a territory immensely rich, and of great extent, which for years has been valueless, because unknown, but which is now attracting the surplus population of Europe and the older Provinces of our Dominion to such an extent as to warrant most hopeful results for the more immediate future.

I feel certain that if an intelligent vote of the Electors of the constituency is cast I will be returned at the head of the poll, not upon my own account, but on account of the party and principles I represent.

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Laws Regarding Newspapers.

1st.—Any person who takes a paper regularly from the post-office, whether directed to his name or another's, or whether he has subscribed or not, is responsible for the payment.

2nd.—If a person or persons his paper to be discontinued, he must pay all arrearages, or the publisher may continue to send it until payment is made, and then collect the whole amount, whether the paper is taken from the office or not.

3rd.—If subscribers neglect or refuse to take the periodicals or newspapers from the office to which they are directed, they are held responsible until they have settled their bills. Sending numbers back, or leaving them in the office, is not such notice as the law requires.

4th.—The Courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers or periodicals from the post-office, or removing or leaving them uncollected for, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud.
