In 1860 a considerable export of pipes to San Francisco was first developed, while large quantities of cigar-tips were sent to America and Australia via Hamburg. Since then the conditions of the trade have altered chiefly in consequence of the high duties imposed in America. In that country arose, with the aid of emigrant turners from Austria, a home industry, which has successfully competed with the Vienna pipe manufacture, (for the products of which America was previously the best customer). With France and Germany, the United States obtain the raw product mainly from Austria.

The best chimneys are made by inclosing hard baked glazed pipe in a thin wall of brick.
