Towards the end of last month most ingenious method of smuggling diamonds into the United States from Canada was discovered by the custom house officials. It appears that homing pigeons are regularly trained at various places in the States, and after a few trial trips are despatched from Canada with a small quill of a turkey feather filled with jewels attached to the leg. shed, &c.
