

Cattle Notes.

The New York Tribune says :- Mr. George F. Lord, Elgin, Ill, "one of the State's most successful dairymen," keeps 100 cows on his 300 acre farm, which is not so remarkable as the fact that he "has not raised a pound of hay for years." His dependence is corn fodder, drilled 31 feet apart, cut when in blossom, one row at a time, with a selfraking reaper, the machine throwing it off in gavels, which, when sufficiently wilted, are bound, "set up in large stacks," and left thus to cure till winter, when it is stored in the barn. He secures in this way about seven tons of the dry forage per acre, which he claims

is "worth as much as the best hav." Messrs. Dingham, Cedar Falts, lowa, says the New York Tribune, who make money out of cattle feeding, are giving now to their 200 steers in preparation for the Christmas market a daily ration of four tons-"one-half good, sweet hay, cut fice; three-eighths in weight of corn meal, and one-eighth wheat or oat shorts," thoroughly mixed and moistened. Besides this they have free access to all the dry hay they want, and pure water without limit. The local Journal says the stock is "thriving immensely," and will "prove as fine a lot as ever left the State.'

ARRIVAL OF THE GRANITE MATERIAL FOR THE PEDESTAL.

The granite material for the pedestal to be erected in the Queen's Park for the statue of the late Hon. Geo. Brown has arrived in the city from Montreal, and will be placed in position at once by Mr. Forsyth, of Montreal, the contractor.
