The Deputy Corruptors.

It is now a well known fact that a number of notorious characters have for some time past been the chief actors in many of the elections in this Province. They are now here, now there, doing, it is believed, the dirty work of the Federal Government, or of those who are reaping the personal benefit conferred upon them by the national policy at the national expense. Who has them in pay is not publicly known, nor has the amount expended in their maintenance been brought to light. The kind of work they do is in part explained by the evidence obtained at the Muskoka election trials; but more needs to be known, and the public should not be satisfied until this political Salvation Army is brought into court and compelled to divulge the whole of its scheme of operations and where it obtains the funds so lavishly expended in the furtherance of its debasing aims. This is imperatively required in the interests of morality. To permit the existence of a gang of men whose operations are expressly designed to demoralize the electors and win seats in parliament by bribery should not be tolerated in this professedly moral country. Having once been convicted, it is treason to the public to allow them to continue in their evil course. It may be a new thing to denounce men for going from place to place to aid their political friends; but in this case, where the object is nothing else than to gain victory by fraud, it would be wrong to allow them to pass without challenge; moreover, if they are the paid agent of any party, the facts should be known. If of manufacturers, it is had enough; but if of the Federal Government, it will be clearly understood that they are paid from the public chest. In either case they are not bona fide politicians but mere party hacks, earning their daily bread by the prostration of their talents to the worst of purposes, debasing themselves while striving to corrupt others. It is scarcely conceivable that the Conservative party, as a whole, can give their sanction to the employment of such a gang. The greater number must scorn the use of questionable means of furthering their own views. They aim at good stable government, not at mean trickery, and assuredly they cannot stoop to downright knavery to keep their friends in power. Signs are not wanting that this system of corrupting the electors is working injury to those who practise it. It is a turning of the tide in an opposite direction, which is either because there is an objection to the policy of the Government or to the means employed to keep it in office; and no party can long remain in power that rests for support upon such agencies as have been at work in Ontario for some past. Better far for the credit of Conservatives that they were rid of the Shields and Pringle gang, which is doing them a great deal of harm; and, should an investigation fasten the odium of employing them to win elections upon the Federal Government, it will as inevitably lead to their expulsion from power as the Pacific scandal did.

Female Voters.

A correspondent who signs himself "A Staid Man Who Hates Novelties" sends us the following:-

The motion carried in the Verulam council for placing females on an equal footing with males as regards the elective franchise, is quite a novelty in Canada and of doubtful utility. Carried into operation, all the daughters above 21 will have votes as well as the sons, but between that age and 30 they will not exercise it, except at the urgent request of some would-be Benedict candidate. It is to be feared that, if carried out, it would in many cases be fatal to the candidature of the married, and in this way place in the councils - for a time, at least - a majority of bachelors or widowers, irrespective of their qualification for office. Single women of the required age will for the greater part decline with contempt the proffered boon, and only a small minority will have the moral to face the public gaze at the polls. How their example will affect the rest of the sex possessing the franchise can as yet only be a matter of conjecture; possibly it may ere long induce the whole to become exasperated politicians, a thing of doubtful public benefit and not to their own good. Women are said to be naturally conservative, (not of dress, of course), but of modest diffidence - one of their sweetest characteristics. The proposed measure, ostensibly in their favour, would, if adopted by them, do much to eradicate that diffidence, without yielding anything to replace the loss. We shall be surprised if they do not reprobate the whole thing, and regard it as a measure calculated to lower rather than to raise them in the eyes of those whose favour is their greatest happiness.

Somerville Council.

The council met this 17th day of December, 1883, pursuant to adjournment. All the members present, the receive in the chair. The minutes read and passed. The following communications were laid before the council: From the Woman's Suffrage Association and answer from the Midland Railway Company. The road commissioners' report for the year of 1883 were laid before the council. Mr. S. Suddaby and H. F. Perdue report as follows. That they expended as directed by law 237, the sum of sixty seven dollars, for the order of the treasurer have been honored, eight dollars having not been expended. Samuel Suddaby reports separately as follows. That he expended ninety-seven dollars on the 6th concession in building bridges at Union creek, leaving a balance of three dollars unexpended. A special grant of 12 dollars between the 4th and 5th concessions near lot 10 has been expended, and also ten dollars in making a road across the river between the 6th and 7th concessions. Mr. S. Suddaby in conjunction

with Mr. Henry Sisson reports that they expended fifty dollars on the side line between lots 15 and 16, as directed. Report also that the road is now barely passable and requires further improvements. Mr. John Windrim reports the expenditure of \$20 as directed by council on the ledge and crossway between lots 15 and 16, cons. 6 and 7. Mr. Geo. Rumney reports that he has expended on Hugh's road \$10, on Cobcock road \$30, on the base line \$15 and on the Lutterworth road \$10, being the amount granted under the by-law. Mr. John Argue reports the expenditure of \$29.95 by days' work on the Monk road, a detailed statement of which has been laid before the council and approved. Mr. F. Train reports that he expended the money as follows: On concession lines 10 and 11, blasing rock, \$10; on main street, Kinnmont, \$10; on Monk road, at station, \$20; on Ozlestone road, \$5; repairing approach at south end of bridge, \$20. Mr. Paul Greig reports as follows: On 14th con., grading, \$15.00 Mr. Martin Byrne reports as follows: On line between cons. 8 and 9, \$30, in grading, &c. Mr. Thomas Watson reports as follows: Expended on Fenelon Falls road, in grading, \$40.50. Gale and Shiers report as follows: On side line between lots 21 and 22, cons. 1 and 2 and 2nd concession line, in grading, &c., \$30. Mr. George McFarland reports that he expended on Sanguin's hill, in grading, \$10. John Fell reports the expenditure on 2nd concession line from Hugh's west to Kinnmont road, that Wm. Hughes cut it out for \$10 per acre, 3 1/2 100 acres, and that order for \$29 has been given and paid, leaving a balance due W. Hughes on completion of work, and also the expenditure of \$4 paid to D. Steel, and \$29 to James Armstrong for work on side line between lots 12 and 13.

Moved by Mr. Graham, seconded by Mr. Suddaby. That the following accounts against the corporation be paid: E. D. Hurd, printing notices, \$7; A. Humes, work on Cobcock hill, \$1 00; George Graham, repairing road tools, \$5 25; John Fell, commission fees, \$2; George Rumney, do., \$3; S. Suddaby, do., \$7 50; H. F. Perdue, do., \$4 50; F. Train, do., \$3; John Fell, councilor's fees and notices, \$16 65; George Rumney, do., \$23 50; H. F. Perdue, do., \$17 50; S. Suddaby, do., \$13 50; H. Graham, do., \$22 50; George Rumney and H. Graham, examining swamp for one day, with a view to letting water off Monk road, \$3; John Hodgins, crossing on F. road, \$20; James Armstrong, work on road, \$20; D. Steel, work on road, \$4; W. S. Dowson, half year's salary as clerk, \$40; do., treasurer, \$22 50; school rates, \$11; postage, \$2 50; John Hodgins, rent for room, \$10 - Carried.

Moved by Mr. Perdue, seconded by Mr. Suddaby. That the clerk be instructed to enquire of the township council of Verulam how the statute labour along the north boundary of said township of Verulam was performed the past season, as it appears that no statute labour from the township of Verulam was performed on the boundary, and to notify the said Verulam council that this council claims compensation for the labor lost to the boundary line - Carried.

Moved by Mr. Graham, seconded by Mr. Rumney, and resolved that the time for the return of the collector's roll be extended to the first day of February, 1884 - Carried.

Moved by Mr. Perdue, seconded by Mr. Rumney. That the council now adjourn - Carried.

School Board Proceedings.

Fenelon Falls, Jan'y 2nd, 1884. The Board met, and Messrs. Greene and Mitchell made declaration of office. Members present Messrs. Naylor, Mitchell, Greene, Cunningham and Moffat. Minutes of previous meeting read and approved.

Moved by Mr. Cunningham, seconded by Mr. Moffat. That Mr. Naylor be chairman for this year. - Carried.

Moved by Mr. Cunningham, seconded by Mr. Greene. That we accept Mr. Cunningham's tender for twenty cords of sawn two foot wood as per advertisement - Carried.

Moved by Mr. Greene, seconded by Mr. Cunningham. That the following accounts be paid: E. D. Hurd, printing, \$1; Thomas Littleton, repairing stool, \$1 75; Joseph Heard, putting up stoves, \$2; John Nugent's account for 1880, '81, '82 & '83, \$5 40 - Carried.

A NEW FACTORY - Mr. Joseph McArthur informs that he has leased the site of the old saw and door factory, destroyed by fire in 1880, to Mr. McKeown, who will put up a large building as soon as possible and commence manufacturing sash, doors and household furniture. Further particulars as soon as we can get them.

SINGING CLASS - Last Wednesday evening about thirty persons assembled in the Presbyterian church, Fenelon Falls, with a view of forming, if possible, a singing class under the instruction of Prof. Sater, who was present and gave an exhibition of his system of teaching and rendering music. Prof. Sater has a highly cultivated voice, and his style of rendering music is intelligent; his aim being to bring out the full sense of the psalm or hymn. All present seemed to be well pleased with what they saw and heard. A committee was appointed to make the necessary arrangements for forming a class, which will meet every Tuesday evening at 7 o'clock during the quarter.

THE ELECTION TRIAL - To save time and trouble in the North Victoria election trial it was transferred to Toronto after some thirty witnesses had been examined, and their evidence is being reviewed and argued upon at O-zoode Hall. If it is considered sufficient to vitiate the election there will be no necessity for examining the other witnesses; if not, the trial will be proceeded with, should the petitioner wish it. Judgment will probably be given on Tuesday next. There has been proof of a sufficient number of violations of the law to upset half a dozen elections; but they do not count unless committed by the respondent himself or his undoubted agents, and agency in

these cases is sometimes rather difficult to establish.

A SNOW BLOCKADE - New Year's Day was exceedingly fine and pleasant, but on Wednesday a storm of wind and snow set in from the west, gradually increased in violence, and raged furiously for over forty-eight hours, blocking up the roads so that travel was next to an impossibility. On Thursday the train on the Victoria Railway managed to make its regular trips, though with much difficulty, but next day was cancelled, as it was obviously impossible for it to get through; but the engine was probably employed clearing out some of the cuts, which must have been drifted nearly full. With teams two miles an hour was the most that could be made, and to average it shovels had to be used in some of the worst places, where the horses would be fairly up to their backs in snow. To-day (Saturday) the train from the north arrived at Fenelon Falls about noon.

THE NOMINATIONS - In compliance with the requirements of the law, the nominations took place in the various municipalities on Monday last, the 31st ult. In Fenelon Falls the reverend Mr. Joseph McArthur, was re-elected by acclamation, and Messrs. J. J. Brandon, E. Fitzgerald, H. W. Greene, G. G. Keith, C. W. Moore, J. J. Nevison, Wm. L. Robson, S. Swanto, D. G. Smith, F. Sandford and John Thoms were nominated as councillors; but Messrs. Fitzgerald, Keith, Moore and Robson resigned, and the contest next Monday will be between the other seven. In Fenelon Messrs. John Daniel and J. D. Naylor were nominated for reeve, Messrs. Isaac Knight and T. Smithson for deputy-revee and Messrs. W. P. Ferguson, W. Isaacs, I. G. Moynes, J. P. Palmer and W. Hall for councillors. In Verulam Messrs. C. Fairbairn and Wm. Thurston were nominated for reeve, Messrs. John Junkin and Robert Kennedy for deputy-revee, and Messrs. Jas. Lamb, John Kelly, Jas. Lithgow, Thos. Robertson, John Braden, Geo. Justice and John Bell for councillors. In Somerville Messrs. A. H. Carl and John Fell were nominated for reeve, and Messrs. George Eade, Joseph Eades, Henry Graham, H. F. Perdue, Geo. Rumney, Benjamin Smith and S. Suddaby for councillors. In Bobayzeong Messrs. S. W. Crabtree and J. L. Read were nominated for reeve, and Messrs. H. W. Hurehime, Alex. Orr, W. B. Read, John Kennedy, Irvine Junkin, Thos. Bick and Chas. Bradford for councillors.

Frightful Railway Accident.

NEARLY THIRTY WORKMEN KILLED AND AS MANY MORE WOUNDED.

(From last Thursday's Globe.)

An awful accident opens the new year for Toronto. Yesterday morning at five minutes to 7 o'clock the suburban train on the Great Western Division of the Grand Trunk Railway was run into by a special freight from the west about 140 yards west of High Park station. The result is not less than twenty-seven men killed and from twenty to forty more or less badly mangled, scalded and burned. The suburban train, consisting of the "dummy" engine and three cars, had its usual load of about sixty men being conveyed to their work at the Belt Factory, just east of the Humber. Through some error not yet explained, the freight train passed the last stopping place, Mimico, and came thundering down the grade. The engineers on the two trains saw that disaster was inevitable, that no human means could save those to whom the crash came. In a moment the worst had come. The heavy freight locomotive, with its train of laden cars behind it, drove the dummy engine clean through the car to which it was attached, and mounted both piling freight cars still higher. What had before been a car full of strong, heavy men became in an instant a sickening death-trap filled with mangled, bleeding humanity. A second later the boiler of the dummy engine exploded, and the steam and water scalded and carried death or more awful injuries to the majority of the poor creatures. But this was not all. Fire followed and completed the calamity. The air was filled with shrieks and groans. Those who escaped injury and were able to do anything at once set to work to extricate those whom it was possible to save. Agencies of sufferers were indescribable lying out in grey dawn of cold winter morning poor fellows piteously besought those near them to pour water upon their scalded limbs and bodies, to do anything to ease their intolerable pain. The wounds inflicted and injuries done were awful beyond telling. Every possible phase of disfigurement was to be seen. Unless one witnessed the sight it would be impossible to believe that the human form could be made to assume such dreadful shapes. Limbs cut, bruised, mangled, half eaten away by fire, swollen to enormous sizes by the action of the steam and water. No horror was left to the imagination; no nightmare of the wildest could show anything more awful than this scene.
