"Keep the Ball Rolling."

By an article in another column, from the Peterborough Review, it will be seen that a deputation of delegates from interested municipalities is to go to Ottawa on the 5th prox. for the purpose of interviewing the Minister of Canals and Railways with reference to the continuance of operations on the Trent Valley route, and at the first meeting of our new council on Monday evening next representatives of this village will probably be chosen.

The Costliness of Honesty.

A writer who signs himself "Ranger" is contributing a series of "Letters to Eminent Persons" to the Toronto News, and the last is addressed to the Hon. Oliver Mowat, who is dealt with very leniently for "Ranger," and credited with having "from the first been actuated by good intentions," but says the critic, "has at last been compelled to yield to the necessary conditions of political life in the country," and has consequently done some few things that he probably would not have done but for the unfortunate existence of the "necessary conditions." It is in no way incumbent on us to defend Mr. Mowat, who, even though much worse than his deadliest enemies paint him, would be a model of purity compared to certain other eminent persons whom we could mention; and we only quote the above remarks for the purpose of showing that a writer of considerable observation and ability shares the more than once expressed opinion of the Gazette that the possession of a superabundance of honesty militates strongly against the possessor's success in life.

The proposal to send a deputation to Ottawa, on February 5th, to interview the Minister of Railways and Canals in regard to the prosecution of the works on the Trent Valley Navigation, will, we have no doubt, be considered opportune. There should be a strong and influential delegation from all the localities along the proposed route, so as to impress the administration with the interest that is felt in this matter.

Miss McArthur takes this opportunity of returning thanks for the same, and wishes the young people every enjoyment of the New Year.

ADVANCING.—In our advertising columns will be found a card from the reeve, thanking the electors for having again placed him in the position he occupies. Our villagers are evidently advancing in their knowledge of the properties, and next year the candidates will no doubt announce that they are such in print, and make a few remarks suited to the occasion, which will be a compliment to the voters and a benefit to the Gazette.

PERSONAL.—The many friends of Mr. R. E. Glanville, formerly of this village, and now of London, Ont., will be glad to hear that he is rapidly recovering from the severe attack of typhoid fever by which he was lately prostrated. In a letter just received from him, Mr. Glanville tells us that while thinking during his sickness of his sins of omission and commission, he remembered that he had neglected to send a trifling amount for the Gazette, and accordingly encloses the amount. If we believed that typhoid fever would have the same result in all cases, we should wish that about a hundred of our subscribers had it; but a great many of them are so hardened that it would probably take cerebro spinal meningitis as well as the fever to make them repent of their delinquency.

REPEATED.—The dramatic entertainment given by our village amateurs in Ingram's hall on the evening of the 4th inst. was so highly spoken of by all present that those who were prevented by the unusually stormy weather from attending felt that they had missed a treat; and for their benefit the performance was repeated, by request, last Wednesday evening, when the audience was nearly or quite as large as on the first occasion. The pieces played were "Cinderella," "Matrimony," and "The Train to Mauro," besides which there were two very good tableaux—"The Sleeping Beauty" and "No Rosa With out a Thorn." On Wednesday evening Mr. Vernon, of Woodstock, who happened to be in the Falls, added to the attractions of the entertainment by giving a display of his ventriloquist powers, which are fully equal to those of many a so-called "Professor," and afforded great amusement, especially to the juvenile portion of the audience.

MORE SNOW.—There is four times as much snow upon the ground as is required to make good sleighing, and more or less is added to it almost every day. For this we probably have to blame Mr. Vennor, against whom the Clerk of the Weather appears to have a peculiar spite, and seems determined to ruin his reputation as a prophet. Consequently when Vennor sat down and wrote, in his almanac for 1884, "The first days of January will be mild; no snow, but dust or mud in many places," he might have known that his enemy up above would make it just the reverse, and that he (Vennor) would be blamed accordingly. The quantity of snow that has already fallen is tremendous for so early in the season, and if a genuine thaw sets in, as is usual in January, the residents of low and flat localities will be in danger of drowning, and punts will be at a premium. The people of this village need not fear being flooded out of their houses, and the worst afflictions they can possibly suffer from the superabundance of snow are the stoppage of trains, the non-arrival of mails and the unaturally high price of fuel.

A French meteorologist has, in the exposed court of his house, two bars of iron planted in the earth, to each of which is fixed a conductor of coated wire, terminating in a telephonic receiver. His practice is to consult the apparatus twice or thrice every day, and it never fails, through its indications of earth currents, to give notice of the approach of a storm twelve to fifteen hours ahead.

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Twenty Labourers Run Down by a Train.

BRINTON, Pa., Jan. 10.—Fifteen or twenty men employed in clearing the snow from the railroad track were at work about seven o'clock last evening, in a cut just east of here, when an accommodation train rounded the bend. Before the men could get out they were run down by the train. It backed up, and the dead and dying were seen scattered for fifty yards. The bodies of two men were found badly mangled, with life already extinct. Five others were badly injured and one has since died. After the accident the men crawled out of the snow in all directions. It is feared the bodies of others may be discovered. The accident was caused by the failure of the men to have a look-out to warn them of the approach of trains. It was dark, and locomotives near by with steam escaping made it impossible to hear the coming train.

The C. P. R. Laborers.

Over 100 C. P. R. labourers have lately returned to Montreal, and some of the most respectable among them relate tales of hardship, stating that on landing at Thunder Bay they were told that the boss would arrive and give them work in a week or two. The steamer that brought them having left the men determined to walk to Prince Arthur's Landing. This they did, their food consisting of scraps begged from camps on the line of march. Some 40 men started to walk from Owen Sound to Toronto. Their trunks and other baggage being a burden to them they abandoned them. Some tried to get work in the woods, but the most of them made the best of their way home on foot. One young man, Alphonse Cole, of Quebec, arrived here three weeks ago with his feet so badly frozen that he has been in the hospital ever since. Mr. F. Vanasse, member for Yamaska, intends to ask for a parliamentary enquiry into the matter, and to bring in a bill protecting labourers under such circumstances.

A Slave's Devotion.

The most thoroughly eloquent and effective speeches ever made in the Texas Legislature, says the Fort Worth Gazette, were pronounced by two negroes, and both were of the same general import—a slave's devotion to "an old master and mistress." The following is an extract from one of these speeches:—"There can be no great race enmity between us. This cannot come while my old master and mistress live. No, nor while their children and mine survive. They were kind and generous to me. I knew no want of today or care for the morrow when I was their property. Look at these wrinkled, rough hands. They tell the tale. They tell how I toiled for them. And the story is not ended. They are old and helpless now, and live, as I once did, in a little cabin, and I still toil for them. I send them half of every dollar I draw from the State Treasury, and when their daughter, a beautiful and good girl, whom I used to carry when she was a child in these stony arms, was married not long ago I sent her a cheque for \$1,000. Have I not the right to ask you, gentlemen of the majority, to deal generously with my race?"

In a single year the enormous sum of \$27,000,000 was paid out by Americans for matches.

The coroner's jury in the late Humber disaster have returned their verdict, and Conductor Barber and Engineer Jeffrey have been committed for trial on the charge of manslaughter.

An old coloured man in Cincinnati has become wealthy in a curious way. Whenever a man bought a building lot the darkey would buy a strip of ground next door and begin to build a cabin. The rich man, generally a high-toned citizen, would buy the darkey's land for ten pence.

Lord Charles Beresford, member of Parliament, in a speech this week, declared that English commerce is at the mercy of any Power who chooses to attack it; that any nation that could send out a few fast cruisers could paralyze our shipping trade. As a captain in the Royal Navy he assumes to know something of the capacity of the service.

SHOCKING JUVENILE DEPRAVITY. WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—W. L. Benjamin, a colored man, appeared in court with his nephew, Alphonse Kell, a 15 year old lad and asked that he be committed for incorrigibility. He told the court the boy had made several attempts to poison several members of the family by placing vermin poison in the milk and in water which they drank; that he had poisoned cattle belonging to him and had attempted to set the house on fire; and that just before Christmas he had attempted to cut the throat of one of the children in the house while she was asleep. The boy acknowledged his uncle's story was true, and confessed that while living in Baltimore he had administered poison to his mother and aunt, who both died from the effects; that he had attempted to poison other people and cattle while in Baltimore, and had set his mother's house on fire. He was committed for examination as to his mental condition.
