Christianity in Alaska.

A note from a missionary in Wrangel, in Alaska, says there are cheering signs of progress. "The hideous dance, the war song and dog-eating are giving place to Christian hymns and earnest prayers; the harrowing scenes of the pyre, which consumed the dead with the sacrificed living, is being superseded by Christian burial. Sabbaths are remembered and religiously kept where the day was unknown. The incense of praise goes up from many a canoe and camp fire. New houses, with doors, windows, floors, stoves, tables, and beds, are giving families homes instead of the communal lodge. Some of the people are beginning to speak and read English, which means elevation, as it could never have come to them in any way with their limited language. Their meaningless superstitious legends are supplanted by the story of the Cross, which they accept with a firmer faith. Young med and women are seeking alliance in Christian marriage, the only hope of circumventing a lamentable and universal vice of the country. They seek, also, employment with the whites Employment means civilization, better food better clothing, permanent homes, Christianity."

Shocking Juvenile Depravity.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9 .- W. L. Benjamin, a colored man, appeared in court with his nephew, Alphonso Kell, a 15 year old lad, and asked that he be committed for incorrigibility. He told the court the boy had made several attempts to poison several members of the family by placing vermin poison in the milk and in water which they drank; that he had poisoned cattle belonging to him and had attempted to set the house on fire; and that just before Christmas he had attempted to cut the throat of one of the children in the house while she was asleep. The boy acknowledged his uncle's story was true, and confessed that while living in Baltimore he had administered poison to his mother and aunt, who both died from the effects; that he had attempted to poison other people and cattle while in Baltimore. and had set his mother's house on fire. He was committed for examination as to his mental condition.
