Capital Punishment. The execution of Tompsett and Lowder at Picton on the 10th inst. for murder, has called forth several letters and two or three editorials in the city papers. As the condemned men were convicted on purely circumstantial evidence and strongly protested their innocence, great efforts were made to procure a commutation of their sentence. and the disregard of the petitions to that effect has been censured by many but defended by the Press. Judge Jel on the subject very freely and forcibly. strongly denouncing the mawkish sentimentality of those who interfered in behalf of the prisoners, and approving of their execution; adding that if men accused of murder are to escape punishment simply because they declare themselves innocent, they might as well be acquitted on their own evidence when intelligent persons who are oppressed by the conviction that Tompsett and Lowder have suffered death for a crime they did not commit, and such persons

will no doubt earnestly quote the dictum that "it is never safe to convict on circumstantial evidence;" but they ought to reflect that unless a murderer is actually eaught in the act, which is rarely the case, the prosecution has nothing to depend on but circumstantial evidence, and if that were disallowed nineteen out of twenty murderers-perhaps we might say ninety-nine out of every hundred-would escape richly deserved punishment. Tompsett and Lowder may have been innocent, but they were convicted on evidence quite as strong as has sent many other men to the gallows-men, too, who confes-ed their guilt when they saw that nothing could be gained by longer denying it.
