Water In the Dietary of Young Children

In a communication to the New York Medical Journal Dr. Remsen, ofthe Nursery and Child's Hospital, calls attention to the general ignorance which prevails as to the necessity of furnishing infants with a sufficien quantity of water, especially in hot weather, and whether they are brought up at the breast, or artificially. For want of this, the fluid portion of any food introduced into the stomach is quickly taken up, leaving the solids too quick to be easily digested. They ferment and produce indigestion and colic, together with diarrhoea. As a consequence of the thickened state of the blood thus produced, excretion of sweat is arrested, and a state of collapse and hyperpyrexia is developed. In warm, dry weather, babies will drink cool water every hour or oftener, if it is, as it should be, offered them. The earliest sign of the water in the system being below its normal standard is a slightly depressed condition of the anterior fontanelle. This may be present in children apparently in perfect health, yet in whom a slight increase of temperature or the deprivation of the breast for a few hours, may give rise to sudden hyperpyrexia Attention is, however, usually first aroused by the fretfulness of the child, a moderate rise of temperature and pulse, a hot, dry skin, and a constant desire to suck. If a free supply of water be given, and nursing restricted in frequency, these symptoms will often disappear completely and quickly, but if not, collapse will soon come on. The temperature ranges from 105° to 106° F., or higher; the pulse is small troubles of teething.

Esquimanx Relics,

All explorers of Smith Sound have found relics of ancient Esquimaux who lived far north, where the natives could not now support life. Dr. Kane found along the east coast of Hall's Basin the remains of ancient huts. Dr. Hayes found many traces of Esquimau settlements on the coast of Grinnell Land, and so did Capt. Nares, who discovered fragments of hunting implements and ruined huts, almost on the shores of Lincoln Sea. On the Greenland side, opposite Lady Franklin copper needles, and stones lying in circles where the natives in summer had lived in sealskin tents and placed the stones upon the outer edge to keep the skin taut over quarters of Esquimaux, and relics showing that they had possessed dogs, sledges,

The Smith Sound natives of to-day have never visited these regions. They have a tradition, however, that many generations ago the climate was much milder than it is now, and that their fathers used to visit tribes living north and south of them. Finally the winters became more severe, and the tribe now dwelling fron Cape York to Smith Sound were cut off from their fellows by accumulations of ice in Melville Bay and Smith Sound. They believed that natives still lived in the north until explorers went there and found only traces of former occupancy.


