Early Printing.

The art of printing on wooden blocks in China seems to be due to the accident of some one desiring a facsimile of an inscription on a stone monument, in the first instance, by the process of rubbing with coloring matter over the paper, and subsequently by covering the stone with Indian ink, placing the paper against it, and rubbing. 
