With feelings of the deepest regret we this week record the death of Sheriff Kempt, who, after several years suffering from Bright's disease, expired at his residence in Lindsay last Monday afternoon in the 63rd year of his age. a general stock of Hardware, The late sheriff was born in Scotland and when a child was brought to Canada by his parents. Upwards of thirty years ago-for we have known him about that length of time-he settled in Lindsay and engaged in mercantile business and lumbering. Being very successful and his personal qualities making him exceedingly popular, he was prevailed upon (in 1867, we think it was) to run for parliament against Mr. Hector Cameron, over whom he obtained la very considerable majority. Upon the death of Sheriff McDougall some twelve or thirteen years ago, Mr. Kempt was appointed his successor, and discharged the duties of that office ef ficiently and successfully until incapacitated by the fell disease that at last carried him off. Sheriff Kempt was one of the most genial, generous and large-hearted men who ever lived, and those to whom he has at different times done personal favours may be counted by scores. He leaves a widow, a sister of the late Mr. Alexander Macaulay. but no children. He was a stanch Re former in politics, and, at the time of his death a Roman Catholic, having Miss Bowes, of Halton, an earnest and joined that church, to which his wife belongs, some two or three years ago but previous to that he was a Presbyterian. The funeral, which took place on Thursday, was a very large one. and, after a grand requiem mass had been performed in St. Mary's church, the remains of the late sheriff were interred in the Catholic burying-ground.

A Canadian Dynamite Act.

OTTAWA, March 6 .- Sir Alexander Campbell yesterday introduced in the setate an act respecting explosives, designed to cope with the dynamite operators. The preamble of the bill sets forth that explosive substances include any materials for making such, and also any apparatus, machine, implement or materials used or intended to be used or adapted for causing any explosive substance, and it goes on to declare that every person who unlawfully and maliciously causes by any explosive substance an explosion of a nature likely to endanger life or to cause injury to property is guilty of felony and liable to imprisonment for life. It is also provided that persons maliciously doing acts or conspiring to cause such explosions and making or having explosive substances with intent to endanger life injure property, is, unless he can show that he made it or had it in his possession or under his control for a lawful purpose, guilty of telony and liable to seven years' imprisonment. I further provided that the "same criminal act may be charged in different counts of an indictment as constituting different offences under this act and upon the prosecution of any such indictment the prosecutor shall not be put to his selection as to the count on which he must proceed.
