### The Disfranchisement Bill.

(From the Toronto News.)

Seldom has public opinion condemned any measure introduced into Parliament as decidedly and unequivocally as it now condemns Sir John Macdonald's franchise bill. No one outside of the veriest party backs who are prepared to support the administration through thick and thin, has a single word to utter in its favor. The more closely its provisions are scrutinized the worse do they appear, and the more evident is the sinister motive influencing its promoters. It is a deliberate scheme to secure a Tory majority irrespective of popular sentiment, and to prevent the expression of the will of the people at the ballot-box.

The public have not asked for this measure. It was not made an issue at the polls at the last general election. It was not discussed in the press prior to its being sprung on the house and the country. There has been no opportunity for the people to pronounce upon the question. No public meetings have been held demanding such legislation. No petitions have been signed in its favor.
