To Clean Marble.

To clean marble chimney-piece you should make a strong soap ley, mixed with quick lime, of the consistency of milk, and lay it on the marble for twenty four hours. Then wash it off, and then polish it with fine putty-powder and olive oil. To clean papier mache, use a soft sponge and co'd water-without soap-dredge it with flour while damp, and after leaving it thus for a short time, wipe it off, and polish the article with a silk handkerchief. 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
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
