

The chief precaution that it seems necessary to take is not to allow the milk to remain at any time at a temperature higher than thirty-five degrees F. The process of freezing is completed in five or six hours.

## A Drawback Wanted.

A curious illustration of the working of a high tariff is seen in the proposal that a drawback should be given to manufacturers of agricultural implements upon goods sent to the Argentine Republic. At first a heavy duty was placed upon agricultural implements so as to give the Canadian manufacturer an advantage in Canadian markets. Then a heavy tax was placed upon iron -to encourage mining and melting, it was said, but the effect has been simply to raise revenue, and that was probably the real intention. The Canadian manufacturer of agricultural implements, hampered by the heavy duties on iron, is compensated by the duties on goods he manufactures. But being so hampered, he cannot trade to advantage in countries where he must encounter competition. He believes, however, that he can sell his goods in these foreign countries if he is given a drawbackthat is, if the Government will refund to him the duty which he has paid on the raw material of the implements he exports. In other words, if he has not to pay duty on the things he buys he can do without the duty on the things he sells. It is obvious that this remark sales in the Argentine Republic, and that if it were not for the oppressive iron taxes the oppressive duties on farm implements would not be necessary. Wages would be just as high and the difference in the price would be so much money in the farmer's pocket .- Globe.
