### W. C. T. U.

(Communicated.) We desire to call the attention of the readers of the Gazette to a communication entitled "Temperance" in its issue of the 8th inst., and trust a discriminating public will discern in it the true fruit of the Spirit, of which they hear so much but see so little that they scarcely know the real article from the spurious when it is presented. We, however, are becoming initiated, and know something of the love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, meekness, temperance, and, we may add, truth, which are practised here, and can pronounce upon the rarity of the types, and the elevated moral tone of society engendered thereby, but never expect to attain the perfection of which we have only had a glimpse. No wonder the gentleman should be alarmed lest any should come down from the high moral altitude which they occupy in common with himself, and be led by a temperance fanatic perhaps so far to forget themselves as to sign the pledge; a consummation devoutly to be feared by him, but a cause of honest rejoicing to us. We have still enough of the earth, earthy, about us to feel sorry when we see a weaker brother debarred from the table of the Lord because fermented wine is used, (and we have seen it,) and are ignorant enough not to care what they did in the days of Noah; but consider it our duty to recommend the use of that which is equally good and pure, and which will not cause our brother to stumble or be made weak. We have seen women and helpless children victims of the most horrid cruelty and in the most abject misery, for which drunken fathers and husbands and a licensed liquor traffic are alone responsible; and at such times we have been righteously indignant, and so far forgot the Christian graces as to be intemperate in speech and action. This was very unwise, and, we have no doubt, had our cultured friend been with us, we should have avoided all such vulgar agitation; for we should have time to go to them and read his smooth flowing Goldwin Smithisms, and persuade them that temperance is the last and least of all virtues, and ask them to quell every evil propensity, and doubtless they would live happy and peacefully ever after. One night some years ago a poor inebriate staggered out of one of our hotels at a late hour, reeled along to the mill race, fell in, and was drowned; a poor woman was left a widow, and young children lost their bread-winner. At a still later period another father of a poor family reeled out of one of our principal hotels near the hour of midnight, and staggered along for some distance. It was a bitterly cold night; a chance passer found him lying unconscious; he was carried back to the hotel and died in a few moments, and another family was thrown upon the charity of a cold world. Yet neither of these cases called forth either protest or remark from our presumed reverend correspondent. Had he risen to the occasion then as he does now, and preached at the proper time and place the commandments of

God, one of which says "Thou shalt not kill," with the same honesty of purpose with which he now tries to kill the temperance movement, he might have seen the Lord's work prosper in his hands, and been spared the annoyance of the late crusade. But the Lord's work is not prospering, and yet it is not for want of preaching; on the contrary, we are up to the gates of heaven in preaching, and yet, God help us! down to the very dust of earth in practice. Here is a clergyman, a leader of men, who knows the besetting sin of this place, yet by inference says drinking is only a little sin, not worth noticing. So hurrah! boys.

### School Board Proceedings.

Fenelon Falls, Feb. 19th, 1889. The school board met, and the members were all present except Mr. Nevison. The chairman took the chair, and the minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. Moved by Mr. Austin, seconded by Mr. Ellis, That the auditors' report of school accounts as received be accepted. —Carried.

Moved by Mr. Robson, seconded by Mr. Nie, That this board approve of the following accounts that have already been paid, and the chairman sign vouchers for the same: James Lamb, ten cords of wood, \$30; William Paul, twenty cords of wood, \$55; Henry Armstrong, cutting wood, 75c.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Nie, seconded by Mr. Robson, That the secretary be instructed to ask for tenders for the local papers for the printing of the auditors' report, one insertion in the paper.—Car'd. Moved by Mr. Austin, seconded by Mr. Ellis, That this board approve of the suggestion made by Mr. McDougall, principal of the school, in his remarks at this meeting with reference to the management of the schools, and that the village constable be instructed to look after truants from the school.—Carried.

### Powles's Corners.

(Correspondence of the Gazette.) The entertainment held in Willock's hall on Friday, the 15th, in connection with the Sabbath school, was a grand success in every way. The programme consisted of dialogues, recitations and vocal and instrumental music. Two of the pieces—"A family not to pattern after" and "A scene in a lumber shanty" brought down the house. The proceeds amounted to \$24. Between fifteen and twenty persons from Fenelon Falls showed their kindness and generosity by being present; and it is not the first and we hope it won't be the last time.
