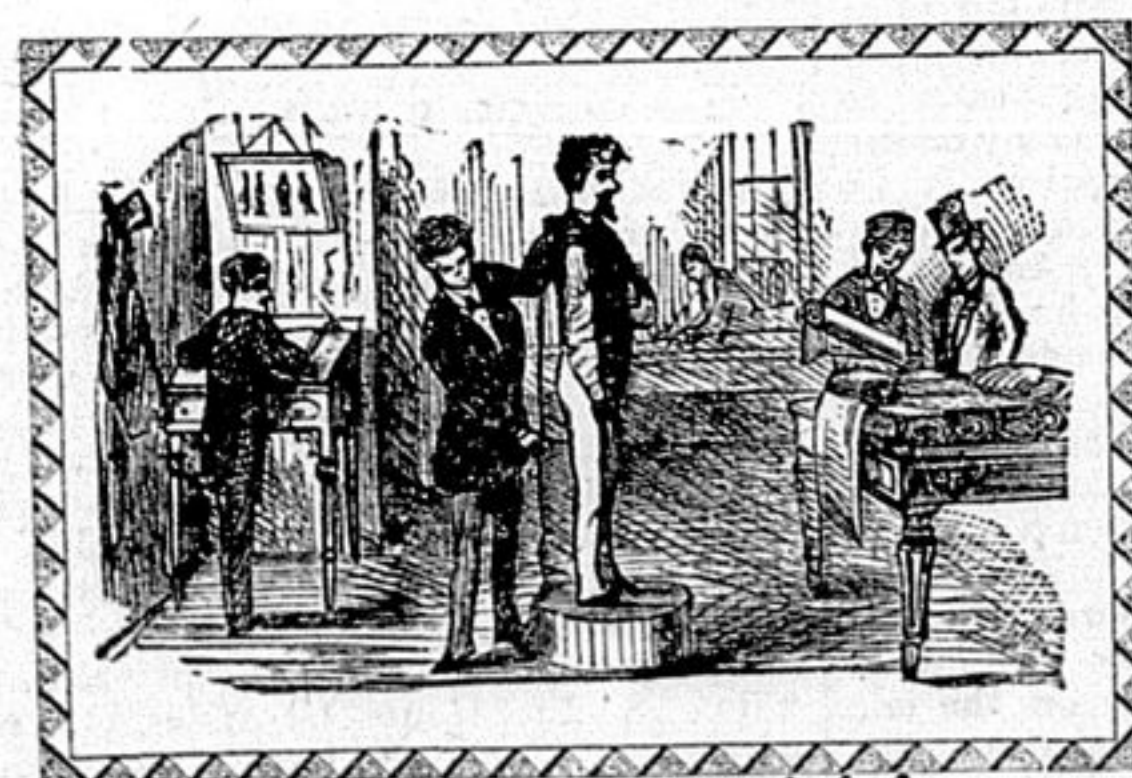

What "Scott Act" Has to Say.

As an attempt will shortly be made
in this county to repeal the Scott Act,
it is only fair to give it the privilege of
speaking for itself; and we therefore
publish the following address to the
electors of Numberland and Durham,
which appeared a few days ago in the
Port Hope Guide, and should be read
by the electors of every county in which
the Act is in force:

GENTLEMEN,—Having served you
for very nearly three years in a very
difficult capacity, at the earnest solici-
tation of a large representation of influ-
ential electors through these United
Counties, I again present myself as a
candidate for your suffrages.

I trust that the fairly successful man-
ner in which I have served you during
that time will secure for me a continua-
tion of your confidence.

I need not remind you that with the
beginning of my term of service and
for nearly two years thereafter, every
possible obstacle was thrown in my way
for the purpose of making my labors in
your behalf ineffectual.

There was, as you are aware, not mere-
ly the policy of a determined and well-
organized opposition to contend against;
but my efforts in your behalf were also
considerably handicapped, at the in-
stance of certain municipal officers, who,
perhaps for popularity in certain quar-
ters, or for other reasons it would seem
difficult to understand, brought certain
legal technicalities to bear against me.

Happily, however, all these difficulties
have been successfully overcome, and
for more than a year your work has fairly
prospered in my hands.

In asking for a renewal of the confi-
dence reposed in me three years ago, I
submit to you what will be my aims in
your behalf if you decide that I shall
serve you another term.

I propose to maintain and advance
the moral standing of the people in every
community throughout the whole extent
of my jurisdiction.

I shall aim to see that the family of
no poor man shall be deprived of the
comforts and the pleasures incidental to
the proper expenditure of his earnings
for food and clothing, rather than that
the same shall be uselessly wasted in
intoxicating drinks.

I shall aim that every town and vil-
lage in these beautiful counties shall
not have from one to twenty loafing and
drinking dens, in which your noble sons
may spend not only their hard earnings,
but their leisure hours, acquiring habits
of idleness and dissipation.

I propose, instead of a few living in

luxury and ease in mammoth piles
erected here and there over the whole
country at your expense, to make an
endeavour that every industrious farm-
er, artisan and laborer will ere long be
provided with a comfortable home,
in which he may enjoy with his family
the legitimate fruits of his labor.

In conclusion, I ask the support of
every elector in the approaching con-
test who may think my aims worthy. I
can with the utmost confidence assure
you that, if you choose me to serve you
another term, now that all difficulties
are removed, I can do so in such a man-
ner as will meet with your hearty ap-
proval.

Temperance vs. Fanaticism.

(Communicated.)

St. Paul was thought to be mad by
Festus on account of too much learning,
but the Fanatics of the present day are
mad with too little. There is not a
Fanatic of the whole number who does
not consider himself perfectly capable of
judging the twelve tribes of Israel.
It is his privilege to take and use such
texts of Scripture as may suit his pur-
pose best, and to leave the rest to the
wicked. Religion to him is nothing,
unless, under the guise of it, he can
force all men to think and act as he
does. In regard to temperance, his one
idea, he uses intemperate and extrava-
gant language. Intemperance in speech
is as sinful as intemperance in anything
else. "For in many things we offend
all. If any man offend not in word,
the same is a perfect man, and able also
to bridle the whole body."—James 3. 2.

The fanatic rushes to the conclusion,
without consideration, that he can con-
vert the world with his one idea. To
reason with him would be as absurd as
to try to enlighten the sun with a far-
thing candle. He is an unreasonable
and an unreasoning man. He mis-
judges or prejudices everything that
interferes with his one idea. The tem-
perance fanatic is not necessarily a bad
man, far from it; on the contrary he
may be an excellent man, and surely
the cause he advocates with such blind
zeal the very best of causes. It is the
way he does it. His intelligence is
necessarily limited. He has only stud-
ied one side of the subject. He insists
on the exclusive possession of truth.
He overvalues his own opinions and
deprecates the opinions of other people.
In his advocacy of temperance he falls
into the opposite vice of intemperance,
in language at least. The Scriptures
require us to resist temptation, but the
fanatic goes a step farther and demands
the removal of it. In the removal of
temptation, our identity as christians
would be in some measure obliterated,
and the requirements of Scripture cau-
celled. We would have no temptation
to resist, and consequently there would
be no need, as now, to pray to God for
grace to enable us to resist it. Self re-
spect is a commendable virtue, but when
carried too far it becomes pride. On the
other hand, humility is not only good
but essential, for we are expressly told
that unless we become as little children
we cannot enter the Kingdom of Heaven.
