

The Negro Exodus From North Carolina.

RALEIGH, N.C., March 17.—The negro exodus from this State is about to take the form of colonization of negroes in Arkansas. The negroes are holding mass meetings almost nightly. Negro orators and preachers of this section are especially active in the matter, and issued a circular yesterday calling a meeting to organize the North Carolina Emigration Association for the purpose of securing organized action towards colonizing all the negroes in the state of Arkansas, where they are offered lands for a trifle. The circulars say that the white people don't want them here and they are determined to go. It is complained that the election law, school law, and other laws passed by last General Assembly were passed to crush them out. They propose to colonize on unoccupied lands in Arkansas and follow agriculture.

In the Stomach of a Horse.

A peculiar case is reported to the Campbellford Herald from the township of Methuen, county of Peterborough. Its informant, Mr. W. H. Cassidy, says that a farmer named James Thompson, who resides in that part of the country, has a horse that became sick and was in such distressing pain that he was about to end its misery with a rifle ball. Fearing the trouble might have arisen from bots or some other cause of that nature, Mr. Thompson administered several doses of strong medicine, which seemed to alleviate the suffering, but to his great surprise he discovered that soon afterwards the animal had passed a yellow-bellied snake nine inches in length. The reptile was dead, but was evidently alive before the medicine was administered, and was the cause of the intense pain. It is possible that the horse, while drinking, swallowed the snake when it was small, and that it lodged in the stomach and thrived until the medicine was given, which killed it, and it afterwards passed out of the stomach with the food.

Crops in the States.

WASHINGTON, March 17.—The weather crop bulletin for the week ending March 16, 1889, says:—The conditions in Dakota and Minnesota have been about the average for ploughing and seeding, but work was interrupted in Dakota by blustering weather from the 13th to the 16th. The weather has been favorable in Illinois, Missouri and Kansas. Seeding conditions are favorable in Nebraska. Wheat is reported as doing well in Kansas, and the favorable effects of fair weather have been felt in Missouri and Indiana. High, dry temperature and a deficiency in rainfall should be injurious to wheat in Michigan, in the southern part of which State snow has disappeared. The crop prospects continue excellent in Kentucky, Arkansas and Tennessee, where spring planting is well under way. The winter wheat is reported as looking very well throughout New York and Pennsylvania. The frost is out of the ground in southern Massachusetts and planting is in progress in New Jersey. Favorable reports have been received from the South Atlantic and Gulf States, where the spring planting has made excellent progress.
