Family Massacred.

CHARLOTTE, N. C., April 22.—W. B. Wood, an industrious farmer of Macon County, was called away from home Monday last, and when he returned Friday he found that his house had been burned, and that his wife, three sons and two daughters had been murdered. He had saved up a few hundred dollars, which he kept in a trunk in the house, there being no banks in the vicinity. This was known in the neighborhood. Several axes and clubs and two large bowie knives, all stained with blood, were found in the ruins. The trunk, broken open and rifled, was found a short distance away. Enough bones were removed from the ashes to prove, with the blood-stained weapons, that the family had been murdered and then burned with the building. When the discovery was made Wood fainted. There is as yet no clue to the perpetrators of the crime.

The Duke of Edinburgh is going home very ill with fever.

The Toledo Blade says that Wellington R. Burt, of Saginaw, president of the Michigan Salt Association, will sail this week for Southampton to secure \$10,000,000, with which, in addition to the pool already formed, the entire salt product of the United States will be controlled. English capitalists are interested.

Mrs. Hannah Battersby, the largest woman in the world, was buried on Thursday at Philadelphia with the aid of a derrick. The coffin was a ponderous affair, of plain walnut, over seven feet long, three feet wide and two feet deep. There were no handles, as they were considered unsafe. The corpse was attired in a black wrapper, trimmed with black silk, a white girdle around the waist, and white crepe laces running around the neck and sleeves. Twelve men were required to lift the casket, which weighed 700 pounds.
