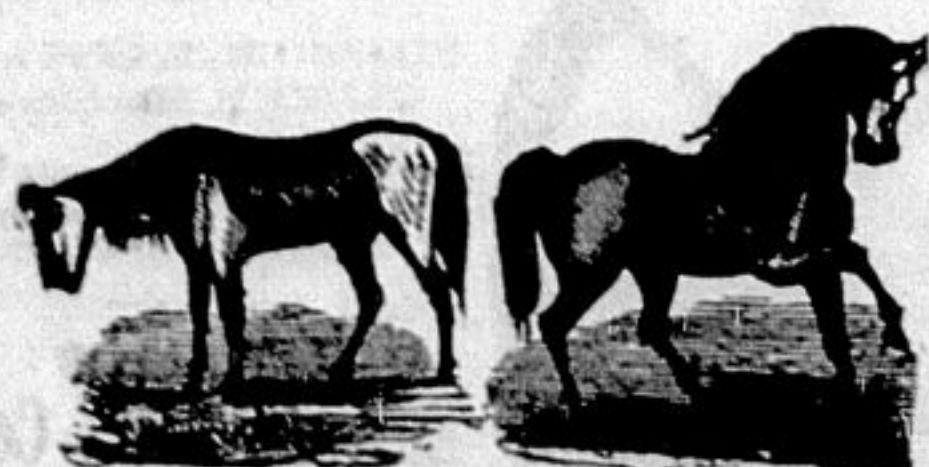

Bishop Dowling.

PETERBORO', April 29.—At the conclusion of the service of vespers at St. Peter's Cathedral last night the congregation, in view of the translation on Thursday of Bishop Dowling to his mother diocese of Hamilton, presented his Lordship with an address of farewell, to which his Lordship replied in his usual eloquent and feeling manner. He said he so loved the people of Peterboro' Diocese and the work and the town that he had written the Pope begging his Holiness to permit him to remain, but Church reasons made the change imperative. At the same time Rev. Father McEvey, Chancellor of the Diocese, who had made himself so indispensable to Bishop Dowling that the latter takes him with him to Hamilton as his secretary, was presented with an address read by Dr. Brennan, accompanied with a purse of \$200.
