

**Forest Fires Raging.**

MINNESOTA AND NORTHERN WISCONSIN BEING DEVASTATED.

St. Paul, May 6.—Furious forest fires are raging in northern Minnesota and northern Wisconsin, and an immense amount of damage has been done. For miles on three sides of Duluth the fire rages, and many country residences have been destroyed. On the Hermandtown road, near Duluth, every dwelling for four miles has been destroyed. It is feared some lives have been lost, as incoming farmers report a vast sea of fire, which is sweeping everything before it. A high wind is blowing, which makes it impossible for any headway to be made against the fire. It must simply burn until there is nothing more for it to destroy. Several houses were burned near Spirit Lake. A large number of telegraph poles have been burned and communication is interfered with. In some places the ties on the railroad track have been burned, making it dangerous to move trains. South of Ashland for 150 miles the forests are ablaze. On the Fond-du-Lac Indian reservation over \$20,000 worth of skidded logs were consumed. Other losses aggregating \$10,000 also occurred on the reservation. Cumberland, Wisconsin, is almost wholly surrounded by fire. The losses aggregate \$40,000 north of Grantsburg. The fire has destroyed everything in its path.

**Stabbed to Death.**

HARRY AXWORTHY, LATE OF TORONTO, KILLED IN PORT HURON.

PORT HURON, May 5.—On Saturday night about midnight a young man named Otto Samberg entered the bottling works and saloon of Jas. Spry, and while there got into an altercation with the proprietor and another young man. The trio adjourned to the street, where the quarrel was resumed. It is hard to get at the facts as to what occurred after, but as near as can be learned Samberg and Spry were fighting when Harry Axworthy, an employe of Spry's, rushed out of the latter's saloon to separate them, when Samberg drew a jack-knife and plunged it into Axworthy's head, breaking the blade off and leaving a piece of it, about an inch in length, in his brain. The injured man lingered until two o'clock this afternoon, when he died. Harry Axworthy was a resident of Toronto, from which place he recently removed his family, and was a quiet, inoffensive man. He leaves a wife and two children. Otto Samberg was placed under arrest this morning. He belongs to one of the wealthiest and most prominent families in the city. An inquest has been called for tomorrow morning.

**Four Young Men Lost.**

THE SAD FATE WHICH BEFEL A YACHTING PARTY FROM MIDLAND.

MIDLAND, May 2.—A sad drowning accident occurred on Tuesday between here and Victoria Harbor. A party of four, namely, Henry E. Jeffery and Robert Little, of Midland; and a young man named Meredith, from Barrie, left Midland on Saturday morning for Victoria Harbor, and at Dollarville, a suburb of this town, took on James P. Anderson, who resides at the old fort. There being a stiff north-west wind blowing that day, they did not return Tuesday on night, but no trouble was anticipated by their respective families. Not returning yesterday, a tug was sent out this morning, when the sail boat was found, with sails set, on the beach, at Methodist island, opposite Victoria Harbor. A searching party immediately started out, headed by Mr. F. W. Jeffery, brother of Henry, and Mr. Roland Little, brother of Robert, and they have been out all day. They found Robert Little's overcoat, and lunch bag belonging to James P. Anderson, which leaves no doubt of the fate of the whole party. Search parties are going out tonight with torches to look for the bodies.

LATER.—Three of the bodies have since been found.

**Peterboro' Happening.**

PETERBORO', May 7.—At the meeting of the Town Council last night it was decided to build a new market house, 60 x 127 feet, to cost \$11,000. The Village of Ashburnham also decided last night to build a new hall costing about \$5,000.

Thirty thousand speckled trout fry, from the Government hatcheries at Newcastle, passed through here to-day for deposit in a lake 30 miles from Ottawa.
