Chinese Disregard for Life.

The Chinese are queer people in many ways. The North China News says that an English gentleman was recently riding on horseback near Pekin, when he saw an excited crowd. Drawing near he discovered a circle of people quietly watching a man desperately attempting to commit suicide by dashing his head against a wall. He dismounted, restrained the man, harangued the bystanders, and learned that this was a coolie, who claimed that his payment for a certain porter's job was short by ten cash-less than a penny-and as the employer refused to pay more he was proceeding to take revenge by killing himself on the spot, knowing that by so doing he would get the other into considerable trouble.

A Chinese newspaper is responsible for this story, which, indeed, has nothing whatever incredible about it :-One day a sow belonging to Mrs. Feng happened to knock down and slightly injure the front door of Mrs. Wang. The latter at once proceeded to claim damages, which were refused, whereupon a fierce altercation ensued, which terminated in Mrs. Wang's threatening to take her own life. Mrs. Feng, upon hearing of this dreadful threat, resolved at once to take time by the forelock and steal a march upon her enemy by taking her own life and thus turn the tables upon her. She accordingly threw berself into the canal.

Canadian Cattle in England.

Cable dispatches from England bring the welcome news that the first shipment of Canadian cattle this season has met with a ready sale at favorable prices, and that the prospects are equally bright for later consignments. A few years ago, when the advisability of feeding cattle specially for the English market was first mooted, croakers poohpoohed the suggestion, and predicted financial ruin for all who would engage in the trade. The results have falsified these gloomy forebodings, and though at times losses have been met, they have been borne with such equanimity as men would be expected to display who are already far enough ahead of the game to feel them but slightly, and the general verdict, on doth sides of the ocean, has been that the cattle industry is an established success. It is gratifying to Canadians to know that, in the face of all the competition which the invention of refrigerator compartments in ocean steamers has rendered possible, exporters of cattle are still able to make a success of their business. Canada is a great country, and needs no booming to make her capabilities known .- Toronto News.

A Youthful Murderer.

UHICAGO, May 17 .- Frank Jasinski, aged 16, stepped out in front of his father's saloon last night with a rifle in his hand. Glancing down the street he saw Frank Kiowski, a lad of his own age, standing in the front door of his home, Jasinski raised the rifle, took deliberate aim and fired. Kiewski fell, the ball having passed through his body two inches below the heart. Jasinski then coolly took aim and fired at another acquaintence, Mike McKay, who stood at the front door of his home, 100 feet away, and Mike fell to the ground, the ball having entered six inches below the left shoulder blade Jasinski escaped. Kiowski's wound is fatal, but McKay's Wm. gang of which young Kuberowski, who shot a lad named Trinor last Sunday night, was a member. Jasinski had in his room a "Wild West" outfit, including knives and revolvers, and a lot of flash literature.

Execution by Electricity.

New York has bought, its electrical apparatus for executions at Auburn, Clinton and Sing Sing. The dynamos produce the "alternating" current that kills at 140 volts. In addition to a Westinghouse dynamo each prisoner will require an "exciter" to be used as an auxiliary to the dynamo; a strong oaken chair, in which the convict is to six and be killed; an electrical cap and electrical shoes. The electrical cap is made of metal covered with sponge, which is saturated with salt water before being put on to the convict's head. When it is on it is called an " electrade," and the other " electrode," to be put on the convict's feet, is a heavy pair of tightly-laced shoes, with sponge inside. A wire, after the "electroded" convict. has been strapped in the oaken chair, is connected with the shoes and cap, the warden of the prison closes the " erccuit " for fifteen seconds and all is over with the convict.
