

Fenelon Falls, June 3rd, 1889. The council met in Court of Revision. Present, Messrs. Austin, McDougall, Deyman and Littleton.

Moved by Mr. Deyman, seconded by Mr. McDougall, That Mr. Austin be chairman .- Carried.

Moved by Mr. McDougall, seconded by Mr. Littleton, That we now adjourn, and resume business at 1.30 p. m. sharp. —Carried.

Moved by Mr. McDougall, seconded by Mr. Littleton, That John Wallace be struck off the assessment roll for west part lot 4, south B east C, as tennorth B east Dean, instead of Simon Swatfigar, and that Simon Swatfigar's name be struck off the roll.-Carried.

Moved by Mr. McDougall, seconded by Mr. Deyman, That the east part of lot 7, north F east C, be struck off nonresident roll and assessed to James McMahon on resident roll.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Deyman, seconded by Mr. Littleton, That the following assessments appealed against be confirmed. G. A. Jordan, lots 7 and 8 west Q east Dodd, \$150; C. Wise, Block C south of river, \$100; Wm. Routley, lot 95 south of river, \$100; and that the north-east part of Block J, south of river, be reduced from $11\frac{1}{2}$ acres to $10\frac{3}{4}$ acres, and that the valuation of \$100 remain as it is .- Carried.

Moved by Mr. McDougall, seconded by Mr. Littleton, That Mr. Campbell's salary as assessor, \$35, be paid, and the reeve give his order for the same .--Carried.

Mr. Ellis gave notice that at this meeting he would introduce a by-law to appoint a pound-keeper for this municipality.

Moved by Mr. Deyman, seconded by Mr. Ellis, That S. Nevison's salary for 26 days, \$13, May 24th, \$1, and prisouer's expenses &c., 80c., be paid .-Carried.

Moved by Mr. Ellis, seconded by Mr. McDougall, That By-law No. -, entitled a bylaw to appoint a pound-keeptime .- Carried.

born in the village of Aisleby, County Durham, England, on the 22nd day of June, 1822, and peacefully passed away Moved by Mr. McDougall, seconded on Sabbath, May 26th, 1889, in the 67th year of her age. In her 23rd year she was united in marriage to her now bereaved and sorrowing husband, Mr. Thomas Robson. Thirteen years later she emigrated with her companion and three children to this country, and settled in and about Newcastle.
