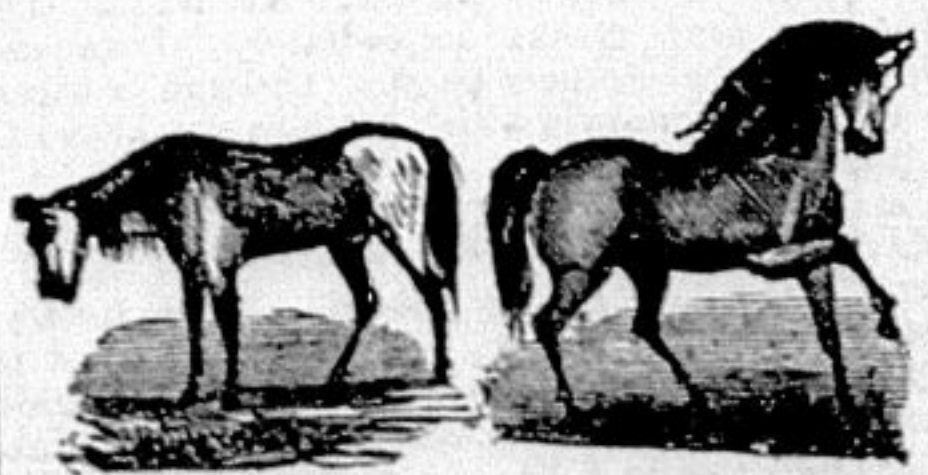

Village Council.

Fenelon Falls, June 3rd, 1889.
The council met in Court of Revision. Present, Messrs. Austin, McDougall, Deyman and Littleton.

Moved by Mr. Deyman, seconded by Mr. McDougall, That Mr. Austin be chairman.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. McDougall, seconded by Mr. Littleton, That we now adjourn, and resume business at 1.30 p. m. sharp.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. McDougall, seconded by Mr. Littleton, That John Wallace be struck off the assessment roll for west part lot 4, south B east C, as tenant, and that he be assessed for lot 12, north B east Dean, instead of Simon Swatfigar, and that Simon Swatfigar's name be struck off the roll.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. McDougall, seconded by Mr. Deyman, That the east part of lot 7, north F east C, be struck off non-resident roll and assessed to James McMahon on resident roll.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Deyman, seconded by Mr. Littleton, That the following assessments appealed against be confirmed. G. A. Jordan, lots 7 and 8 west Q east Dodd, \$150; C. Wise, Block C south of river, \$100; Wm. Routley, lot 95 south of river, \$100; and that the north-east part of Block J, south of river, be reduced from 11½ acres to 10½ acres, and that the valuation of \$100 remain as it is.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. McDougall, seconded by Mr. Littleton, That Henry Brooks' assessment of personal property, \$300, be struck off.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Deyman, seconded by Mr. Littleton, That the assessment of lot 11 south P west C, be reduced \$75.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Deyman, seconded by Mr. Littleton, That John Jones be assessed for part centre part lot 3 east C south F, and that the same be struck off George Cunningham's assessment.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. McDougall, seconded by Mr. Deyman, That the assessment roll as now revised be adopted.—C'd.

The council then took up general business. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. Mr. Ellis entered and took his seat.

Tenders were received from Messrs. Greene and Ellis and James Cameron, to furnish the corporation with plank and stringers for sidewalks.

Moved by Mr. McDougall, seconded by Mr. Littleton, That Greene & Ellis's tender for lumber, etc., be accepted; plank at \$10 per thousand and stringers at \$9.50, delivered.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. McDougall, seconded by Mr. Ellis, That the constable be instructed to notify all parties to remove any obstruction on the streets or any public place, wood, slabs, etc., at once, and to prosecute all parties who obstruct the streets or public places in future.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. McDougall, seconded by Mr. Littleton, That Mr. Campbell's salary as assessor, \$35, be paid, and the reeve give his order for the same.—Carried.

Mr. Ellis gave notice that at this meeting he would introduce a by-law to appoint a pound-keeper for this municipality.

Moved by Mr. Deyman, seconded by Mr. Ellis, That S. Nevison's salary for 26 days, \$13, May 24th, \$1, and prisoner's expenses &c., 80c., be paid.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Ellis, seconded by Mr. McDougall, That By-law No. —, entitled a bylaw to appoint a pound-keeper, be now introduced and read a first time.—Carried.

By-law read a second and third time without amendment and passed in the usual manner.

Moved by Mr. Ellis, seconded by Mr. Deyman, That Mr. Kelly be paid the sum of \$13, one month's salary as sanitary inspector, and that he be re-engaged for one month from 7th June

inst.—Carried.
The treasurer's half yearly financial report was laid on the table.

Moved by Mr. Deyman, seconded by Mr. McDougall, That the following accounts be paid:—John Quinn, for carting, \$1.25; E. R. Edwards, team to Lindsay, \$3; E. D. Hand, for printing to date, \$22.46, and that the reeve give his orders for the same.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Ellis, seconded by Mr. McDougall, That the time for the collection of taxes be extended until the 17th of June inst.—Carried.

The council adjourned, to meet on Monday, 10th June inst.

Verulam Council.

Council met on Monday June 3rd, according to adjournment. Members all present: the reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed.

Moved by J. Kelly, seconded by J. Lithgow, That a by-law be read and passed appointing road commissioners, defining their limits and fixing the amounts to be expended by them.—Carried.

Bylaw read and passed.

Moved by J. Kelly, seconded by J. Braden, That twenty-five dollars be paid to the County treasurer, a portion of the expenses of J. Garner Hunter, an indigent now at the expense of the county, being as agreed upon at the January session, and that an order be drawn on the treasurer for that amount.—Carried.

Moved by J. Kelly, seconded by J. Patterson, That this council continue the grant of a dollar a week until 1st Jan'y, 1890, for a portion of the maintenance by the county of J. Garner Hunter, an indigent.—Carried.

Moved by J. Kelly, seconded by J. Patterson, That the reeve, deputy reeve, and councillor Braden proceed to inspect the gravel pit on the 10th con, on Lots 2 and 3, with power to make such arrangements as to purchase or otherwise as they think proper.—Carried.

Moved by J. Kelly, seconded by J. Lithgow, That the wages for working on roads be \$2.50 per day for man and team, and \$1.12½ for a man.—Carried.

On motion of Mr. Lithgow, council adjourned to Saturday, 6th July.

Obituary.

MARTHA ROBSON.

The subject of this brief mention was born in the village of Aisleby, County Durham, England, on the 22nd day of June, 1822, and peacefully passed away on Sabbath, May 26th, 1889, in the 67th year of her age. In her 23rd year she was united in marriage to her now bereaved and sorrowing husband, Mr. Thomas Robson. Thirteen years later she emigrated with her companion and three children to this country, and settled in and about Newcastle. Five years passed away, when the family came and took up a home in the township of Somerville, where, for twenty long years, she shared in the struggles incident to farm life. The last six years of her life were spent in this village, where her excellent qualities of character rendered her an object of respect and love to all who were acquainted with her. When a little girl, in the old country, between eleven and fourteen years old, she became the subject of converting grace under the ministrations of the Rev. Joseph Spurr, a Primitive Methodist minister, and immediately joined the Primitive Methodist Church, of which she remained a faithful and consistent member until the family moved to Somerville, when she connected herself with the Methodist Church. During the last two years her strength has been failing, and she has been confined a good deal to her home; but while her afflictions abounded, it would seem that God's grace did much more abound. Her protracted illness was borne with true Christian fortitude, and, with those who called to see her, she spoke freely about religion and her prospects for the better country. With her the earthly race is now run, and the work of life is now finished, and with the glorified host who stand on the shore of the crystal sea, she "rests from her labours and her works do follow her." While we profoundly sympathise with the bereaved partner of years and a deeply sorrowing family, we can only pray that the mantle of her piety may fall upon each of them, and that in the "sweet by-and-by" they may all meet each other again.
