A Nameless Hero.

MEROIC, RIDE TO DEATH OF AN UN-KNOWN PAUL REVERE.

Johnstown, Pa., June 3.-A nameless Paul Revere lies somewhere among the dead. Who he is may never be known, but his ride will be famous in local history. Mounted on a grand big bay horse, he came riding down the pike which passes through Conemaugh to Johnstown like some angel of wrath of old, shouting his portentou swarning, "Run for your lives to the hills, " Run to the hills." The people crowded out of their houses along the thickly · settled streets, awe-struck and wondering. Nobody knew the man, and some thought he was a maniac and laughed On at a deadly pace he rode, and shrilly rang out his awful cry. In a few moments, however, there came a cloud of ruin down the broad streets, down the narrow alleys-grinding, twisting, hurling, overturning, crashing and anmihilating the weak and the strong. It was the charge of the flood, wearing its coronet of ruin and devastation, which grew at every instant of its progress. Forty feet high, some say, -thirty according to others-was this sea, and it travelled with a swiftness like that which lay hidden in the heels of Mercury. On and on raced the rider, and on and on rushed the wave. Dozens of MRS. people took heed of the warning and ran up to the hills. Poor faithful rider, it was an unequal contest. Just as he sturned across the railroad bridge the mighty wave fell upon him, and horse, .aider, and bridge all went out into chaos together, and perished, the hero who turned neither to right nor left for safety for himself, but rode on to death for his townsmen.

WINDSOR. June 8 .- A short time ago these despatches related how Joseph Covyeau purchased Charles Covyeau's wife for \$1. Since then the latter de--cided to cancel the bargain, and endeevored to get his wife back, but Joseph would not agree to it. Masters saw him and fired two shots, but Covycau kept going, and reached the marsh. The officers returned home. It is claimed that Covyeau was hurt by the shots, as he limped when running.

The weather among the California mountains has been something whenomenal this season, and is set forth as follows by the Truckee Republican of May 15: "The snow of last week had nearly melted when last Monday another storm set in.
