Hog Raising.

Canadian farmers will do well to
"read, mark, learn and inwardly digest"
the following extract from a
letter received by Wm. Davies & Co.,
of Toronto, dealers in hog products,
from Mr. J. W. Bennett, their agent in
London, England. Mr. Bennett says:
"Canadians are held to be proverbial
for keeness, but in the matter of hog
raising they have terribly missed their
mark." After commenting on the giant
strides made in all pastoral pursuits by
the farmers of Denmark, which country
he recently visited, he adds:

"The Danish farmers take immense
care of their swine. A great feature,
which they hold to be of the greatest
benefit, is to keep their piggeries very
clean, very dry and very warm, espe-
cially in cold weather. I was up there
when the thermometer stood at 18 de-
grees below zero, and I could not help
thinking it was the counterpart of your
country in winter. They have the same
difficulties of weather and cold that you
have to encounter, but they battle with
the elements successfully, and the cow-
houses and piggeries are pleasing to see,
all these animals clean, dry and warm,
and of course thriving and doing well.

Now, what Denmark has done with a
very poor country and only two millions
of people, Canada can do, and do easily.
Only let the farmers see that to raise all
the hogs he can will pay him better than
anything else, just as clearly as the
Danes see it, and a big future is in
store for Canada. The Danes are pun-
ishing the Irish bacon-curers and pres-
sing them very closely in market values
to-day in England, and I feel certain
they will outstrip the Irish farmers in
the race. In Ireland they do not un-
derstand pig feeding and rearing nearly
as well as the Danes do. They (in Ire-
land) overfeed, keep the hogs wet and
dirty underfoot, and pay little attention
to the state of their piggeries. All this
is most detrimental to hogs thriving
fast and well.

If you can induce the farmers of Can-
ada to supply you with a suitable hog,
we can find an outlet for any quantity,
because Canadian bacon as prepared by
you is in good favor and treads close
upon the heels of Danish bacon in val-
ue, but you want a steady supply all
the year round to keep the article al-
ways upon the market and in front of
the buyers."

Somerville Council.

The council met on June 10th, 1889.
All the members present and the reeve
in the chair. The minutes of last meet-
ing were read and approved and signed
by the reeve.

A communication from Bowman Bro.,
P. L. S., was laid before the council;
also a communication from Messrs. Mar-
tin Byrne, John T. Henderson, William
Doherty, Rob't H. Henderson, B. Boynton
and others, making complaints of
the very bad state of the roads, and
asking that money be granted for their
repair, was heard.

Moved by Mr. Wilson, seconded by
Mr. Perdue, That the reeve and Mr.
Graham be requested to examine the
following roads: Byrne's line, Cole's
line, Crego's creek bridge, and the side
line between lots 6 and 7 south from
the Monck road, and report to the coun-
cil at its next meeting.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Wilson, seconded by
Mr. Perdue, That By-law No.—, a by-
law to establish a line of road or street
in the village of Kinmount, be now read
and passed.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Graham, seconded by
Mr. Wilson, That By-law No.—, a by-
law to authorize the trustees of Union
School Section No. 3 of the townships
of Somerville, Galway and Snowden to
borrow the sum of seven hundred dol-
lars for the purposes therein mentioned,
be now read and passed.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Graham, seconded by
Mr. Rumney, That the reeve be author-
ized to send Thomas Bateson to the
general hospital at Toronto, and pay the

usual fees for one month.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Perdue, seconded by
Mr. Rumney, That the county treasurer
be instructed to charge the arrears of
taxes against the south half of lot 12,
con. 9, accrued in the year 1887, to the
township, and also the arrears accrued
in the year 1885 against lot 2 con. 13,
the same having been previously paid
the collector.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Perdue, seconded by
Mr. Rumney, That the council do now
adjourn, to meet on the 2nd of July.
—Carried.

July 2nd, 1889.

The council met; the members all
present and the reeve in the chair. The
minutes of last meeting were read and
approved and signed by the reeve.

Moved by Mr. Perdue, seconded by
Mr. Wilson, That the following amounts
be expended to improve the roads as
hereinafter set forth: On the boundary
of Somerville and Lutterworth, \$10;
John Lyle, of Lutterworth, to expend
the same. On Cameron street, Cobo-
conk, to make a culvert to take off the
water from Francis street and Cameron
street, \$25; George Rumney to expend
the same. To build a sidewalk from
the railway station up Dickson street to
Crego street, Kinmount, \$—; H. Gra-
ham to expend the same. On the side-
line between lots 15 and 16 con. 2 north
of clearance to concession line, \$10;
the reeve to expend the same.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Graham, seconded by
Mr. Rumney, That the following acc'ts
against the municipality be paid: Alex.
Morrison, plank and labour repairing
Crego creek bridge, \$1; James Quinn,
repairing bridge, \$6 50; E. D. Hand,
advertising court of revision, \$2; John
Fell, costs of sending T. Bateson to the
hospital at Toronto, \$5; H. Doughty,
extras equalizing union school section,
\$3.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Wilson, seconded by
Mr. Graham, That By-law No.—, a
by-law to authorize the reeve and treas-
urer to sell certain lands acquired for
arrears of taxes, and to convey the same
to purchasers, be now read and passed.
—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Graham, seconded by
Mr. Rumney, That By-law No.—, a
by-law to grant a sum of money to sup-
plement the grant from the Educational
Department to assist poor school sec-
tions to pay teachers' salaries, be now
read and passed.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Rumney, seconded by
Mr. Perdue, That the council now ad-
journ, to meet on the 20th of July at
the usual place, at 10 a. m.—Carried.
