

**Crops.**  
**WINNIPEG, July 20.**—There is no truth whatever in the dispatches sent out from Dakota to the American press stating that there is much starvation in the Territories, owing to their failure of crops. The rains of the past week have wonderfully improved the wheat crops. In the Rockwood and Portage districts they never looked better.  
**St. Paul, July 21.**—A. L. Mohler, Assistant General Manager of the Manitoba Railway, has just completed a thorough examination of the wheat crop along the lines of the Manitoba system. He predicts that the country tributary to the Manitoba lines will furnish for shipment 32,000,000 bushels of wheat. This, he says, is confirmed by Chicago experts.

A Clifford young lady recently received a letter from her best fellow, which was 17 feet 8 inches long.  
 Very large orders have recently been received at Birmingham from the German and French Governments for war-balloons. The German War Office has adopted parachutes, as their value for campaigning purposes has been clearly demonstrated by some recent experiments at Spandau.

Prince Ferdinand, of Bulgaria, who is an ornithologist, has reported that enormous flocks of rose-colored starlings have appeared in his dominions. They come from Asia and Africa, and have not been seen in Europe since 1876. Their advent immediately preceded the Russo-Turkish war.

An alligator and an English sparrow engaged in a battle near Darien, Ga., the other day. The gator provoked the fight by snapping at the bird, which in turn flew furiously at its ugly antagonist, aiming with precision at the saurian's eyes. The gator finally gave up the contest and took to the river.

An English paper published the other day a gruesome story of the kid glove trade. It was stated that, in order to obtain a high degree of fineness and pliancy, the wretched kids had to be skinned before death, though, as a concession to sentiment, they were stupefied with an opiate before the operation.

The famous Sityton herd of short-horns, which has enjoyed a very wide reputation for more than half a century, has been sold entire for exportation to South America. There are 150 beasts in the herd, and great regret is expressed in Scotland at its loss to the country. The price is said to be 10,000 guineas.

The traffic between London and Paris just now is unparalleled in its extent. A few years ago the services to Paris via Dover or Folkestone were five in number. There are now eight. A few years since the shortest time of transit was ten hours. It is now possible to be in the Rue de Dunkerque in seven hours and a half after leaving the Strand.

Workmen doing the grading on a railroad near Atlanta, Ga., witnessed the sight the other day of a snake feeding its offspring. The baby snakes were secure in the roots of an old tree, and the mother, which caught flies by springing at them, would, when possessed of a fly, rapidly glide to the young snakes, which came pell-mell, helter-skelter, to meet her. She caught a fly a minute, and was watched securing them for over two hours.

Wolf Islanders are excited. Their farms have been invaded and fine Holstein and Jersey cattle have been seized by Customs officers. The farmers, during the winter, had secured the animals in the States and driven them across the ice. The action of the officers has thrown many into a panic, and they are ridding themselves of the cattle to save the loss from seizure. Dozens of cattle have been piloted over the river behind skiffs to the American shore to prevent the Canadian authorities from capturing them.
