

A Revolution Coming.

THE COST OF STEEL RAILS TO BE VERY
LARGELY REDUCED.

CHICAGO, July 20.—A firm in this city engaged in the manufacture of tin cans and japanned ware, has patented an invention which competent judges say will revolutionize the tin and steel industry of the world. Patents have been secured in the leading countries of the world. This is a process by which molten metal may be rolled into any desired shape, thus saving all intermediate processes. It was invented originally to roll molten solder in a thin plate, but the process is pronounced by experts to be equally applicable to iron and steel in its various forms of plates, structural iron and rails. It is believed the cost of manufacturing steel rails can be reduced to the extent of \$10 per ton, and that thin iron plates for tinning can be made much below the cost of production of tin plates in Wales, thus making a new industry in this country. The molten metal is passed between rollers which is chilled as it passes, the rollers being kept cool by a stream of water which passes through them. Iron and steel so rolled will be much more even and closer in texture than that made by pressed methods.

Liquor Among the Africans.

Spiritous liquors seem to be quite as new a thing to the African blacks as "fire-water" was to the American red men. It is the universal testimony of men engaged in business, as well as missionaries, that general demoralization has followed their introduction. The first demand of the natives when vessels arrive is for strong drink. The chiefs are becoming drunkards, and degradation is rapidly increasing among the people. It is said that the degree of demoralization is even greater than it was among our own aborigines. There is much agitation, both in England and America, to have steps taken to prevent exportation.

The evil effects of the drinking traffic are seen not only in the moral havoc it makes, but in the destruction of legitimate trade. Vessels go to Africa laden with American or English fabrics to exchange for palm oil, ivory, and other products. The natives refuse the fabrics if they can get liquor, and cases are cited where vessels have brought back portions of their cargoes of cotton goods and the like, because they could not dispose of them. It is thus evident that a continuance of the unrestricted traffic in liquor will not only sow the seeds of death and disease among these ignorant tribes, but deprive civilized nations of a profitable and legitimate commerce which could have no consequences injurious to the blacks.

No Descendant of Macduff.

Henry Labouchere, speaking of the approaching royal marriage, says: Before the marriage takes place it will be clearly necessary for Princess Louise to renounce her right of succession to the throne in the most formal manner. If Prince Albert Victor and Prince George happened to die without issue, Princess Louise would, of course, become heiress to the throne, and it is difficult to contemplate the contingency of the Countess of Fife becoming Queen, with the Earl of Fife as Prince Consort. I congratulate the bride and bridegroom, and trust that they will be happy. But when—as I saw stated in a newspaper—we are told that the marriage consecrates the union between the descendants of Macduff and the British Royal family, I smile. Lord Fife is no more a descendant of Macduff than I am of Macbeth. He is the descendant of a Scotch Jacobite pedlar, who made his fortune, and who was created the Earl of Fife and Lord Macduff in the peerage of Ireland in 1759. His name being Duff, he was the son or Max of Duff, but this Duff was no relation to Shakespeare's Macduff.

A Russian nobleman has recently paid 1,200 roubles (\$600) for a pair of nightgales that are said to render delightfully various national melodies.

Three boys of Jackson, Mich., recently saved a girl from drowning, and the grateful father gave them five cents and told them to divide it between them.

A farmer informed the Brampton *Banner* that a new pest has appeared to bother the crops. The new arrival is a green fly which gets its work on the fall wheat, thrashing out the heads completely. Its ravages so far have not been very serious, and it is to be hoped will not be.

The Giant Diamond, lately discovered in Cape Colony and now at the Paris Exposition, weighs 180 carats, and is valued at \$3,000,000. It is kept in a case by itself, and watchful guardians stand around it all day. At night it is placed in a big safe, which is similarly guarded all night. It is said to be of the first water, and as pure as the famous regent in the French Crown diamonds.
