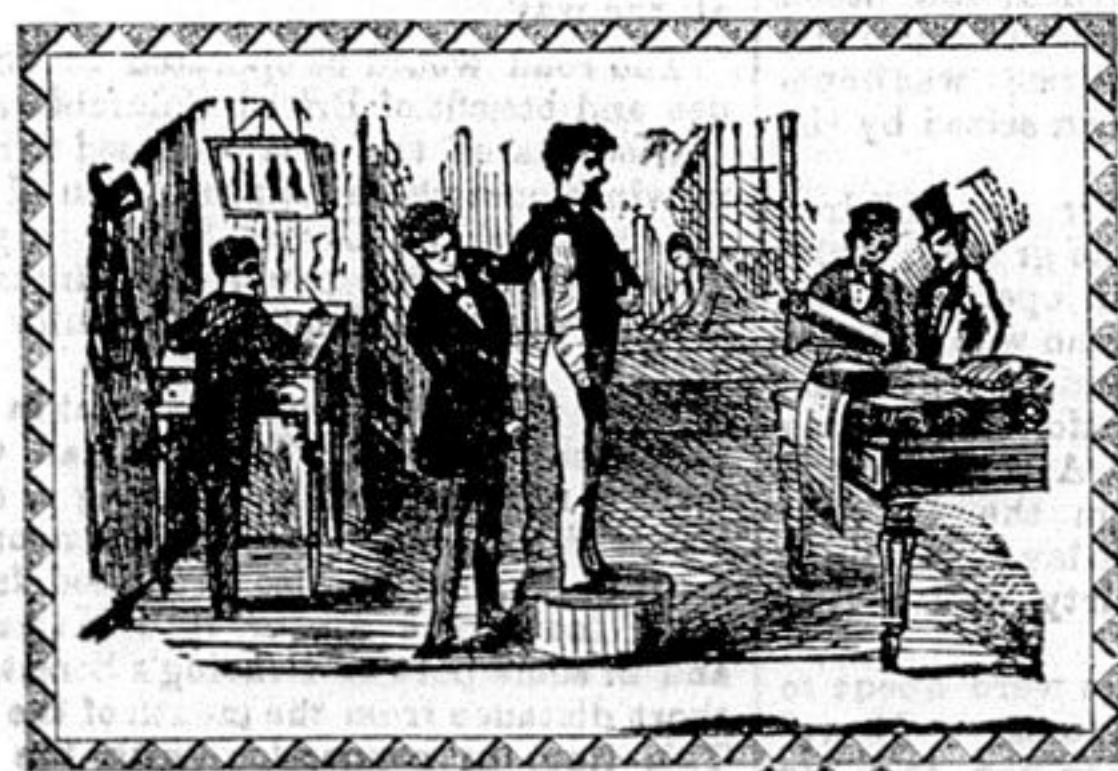

#### Address and Presentation.

(Communicated.)

On Tuesday last some ten or twelve  
members of the W. C. T. U. paid a  
visit to their "Sister of the White Rib-  
bon," Mrs. Keith, on the eve of her de-  
parture for Toronto, and, after devo-  
tional exercises, the following address  
was read and presentation made:

DEAR MRS. KEITH,—

It is with feelings of mingled  
joy and sorrow that we, your sisters of the  
white ribbon, meet this evening; joy, to  
have this opportunity of giving honour to  
whom honour is due; and sorrow, that in  
this instance it is a farewell tribute. For  
be assured, our regret at parting from you,  
as also from your worthy husband and fam-  
ily, is real and unfeigned.

We have always found in you the imper-  
sonation of the spirit of our union; not  
only enthusiasm, but calm wisdom, were in  
the councils with which you have aided to  
keep live flames on the altar of our faith,  
in our application of the fundamental prin-  
ciples of Christianity to the removal of one  
of the greatest stumbling-blocks of the  
Christian Church.

And not alone in the temperance cause,  
but in every good work, was your presence  
felt; so that now, at the hour of parting,  
we are constrained to say, with full hearts,  
and with one accord, "She hath done what  
she could."

And, while noting your labours outside  
the magic land of home, we would not  
overlook your kindly social spirit, nor the  
many re-unions which we have had in your  
well-ordered home, the memory of which

Not failure, but low aim, is crime."

little meetings as coming from you—"The  
Lord is my Shepherd; I shall not want."  
And now, dear Mrs. Keith, we take much  
pleasure in presenting you with this easy

may sometimes remind you of the little  
band of workers with whom, in sunshine  
and shadow, you have so long been asso-  
ciated.

Farewell, dear sister, the Lord bless you,  
and our prayer for you is, "Establish Thou  
the work of her hands upon her; yea, the

#### Village Council.

Fenelon Falls, Aug. 13th, 1889.

The council met at the call of the  
reeve. Members present: Messrs. Aus-  
tin, Ellis, McDougall and Littleton.  
Minutes of last meeting read and con-  
firmed.

Mr. McDougall gives notice that at  
this meeting of council he will intro-  
duce a by-law for the purpose of levying  
and collecting certain rates for the year  
1889.

Moved by Mr. McDougall, seconded  
by Mr. Ellis, That By-law No. — be  
now introduced and read a first time.—  
Carried.

By-law read a second and third time  
and passed.

Moved by Mr. Ellis, seconded by Mr.  
Littleton, That W. L. Robson and Jas.  
Cameron be appointed to audit the  
cemetery books this evening, 13th inst.,  
the same to be handed over to the vil-  
lage treasurer at once, together with all  
moneys and papers.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Ellis, seconded by Mr.  
Littleton, That Mr. John Thomsou's  
account \$20 94, less \$3.20 of an over-  
charge on telegraph poles, be paid, and  
that the reeve give his order for the  
same.—Carried.

Mr. McDougall gives notice that at  
the next meeting of the council he will  
introduce a by-law to appoint a collect-  
or of taxes for the current year.

The council then adjourned, to meet  
at the call of the reeve.

#### Mechanics' Institute.

The Board met at call of the Pres-

have an excursion to Bobaygeon on the  
civic holiday, Wednesday, Sept. 4th.—  
Carried.

There has lately been such a glut of  
herrings that the Scotch fishing smacks  
are leaving Ardglass for home, herring  
being so cheap and plentiful that it does  
not pay to catch them.

A young man at Titusville, Pa., who  
could not afford to take his bride on a  
wedding tour, bought \$5 worth of tick-  
ets for the merry-go-round, and they  
proceeded to ride to their heart's con-  
tent.

A forest fire is raging in Washington  
county, Oregon, which has done great  
damage to farm houses and barns. The  
road leading to Portland is impassable  
owing to the flames, and people are  
fleeing from some of the villages into  
the open plains.

At Brownsville, Me., the other day,  
a number of young men and boys en-  
gaged in a game of baseball. Edgar S.  
Howard, aged 14, went to the bat and  
the first ball struck a dynamite cap,  
which he had picked up on the railroad  
and put in his pocket. The cap explo-  
ded with terrible effect; the whole  
fleshy portion of the lad's right arm  
was blown away and his right side  
lacerated in a frightful manner. He  
was carried to the house of his father,  
a wealthy citizen, but cannot recover.

Colonel G. D. Rogers, editor of the  
*Market Record*, estimates the wheat  
crop in Minnesota and Dakota at 85,-  
000,000 to 90,000,000 bushels. The  
samples of wheat shown by the various  
elevator lines from houses widely apart  
show almost uniform excellence. The  
kernel is bright and plump, in striking  
contrast with that of last year. The  
half dozen cars of new wheat received  
here thus far has sold at an advance of  
about 8 cents over offerings to arrive,  
88 cents being the top figure. It is  
estimated that with no storms the crop  
in Minnesota will be harvested in ten  
days and in Dakota in fifteen days.
