

The Startling Scheme of the Sugar Trust.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 9.—Reports are in circulation that the Sugar Trust has about completed negotiations with an English-German syndicate to get the sugar markets of the world under one supreme control. The plan contemplates bonding for a short term all the principal plantations of Cuba, the Philippine Islands, Java and Mauritius, which would place the main source of the raw supply under the control of the syndicate. The surplus stocks of unrefined beet sugars of Germany and France are to be accumulated in store for shipment to America at the proper time. The supply of raw cane sugar will be curtailed by at least 3-5ths. All surplus unrefined beet sugar will be shipped to America. This would create a deficiency in Germany, France and England, while the American supply would still be short. It is estimated that the sugar trust and the Anglo German partners would pay at least 25 per cent. upon a capital of \$100,000,000, which, according to the rumor, will be necessary to accomplish the gigantic scheme.

The Condition of Ireland

Irish papers report revived trade and signs of general prosperity, such as Ireland hasn't known for many years, and whether it is true or not, this state of affairs is attributed to the resolute attitude of the Government in suppressing outrages and bringing the country under the operation of the law. The people who were once the terror of the League so that they would not pay anything but League calls are now honestly settling their debts, paying their rents and industriously pursuing peaceful ways, satisfied that they will be protected by the Government from the high-handed will of the League, to which, in the days of its power, they were little better than slaves. The "Bloody Balfour" may have faults, but he has certainly reduced Ireland to order, and that would be a herculean task for any man. The occupation of the agitator is now nearly gone, there are no revolutionary speeches, and the makers of the last ones are meditating in jail, the poor upon whom the agitation fell with almost crushing weight are benefitting by the altered condition of things, and suffering is not so great. The struggle against British oppression, so far as it went itself in intimidating tenants, cutting the tongues out of cattle, shooting and maiming lukewarm leaguers and boycotting non-sympathisers, is at an end, because of the firm stand of the Government, and it should be the wish of every lover of liberty that it would continue so.—Toronto News.

Alive in a Crematory Retort.

The Philadelphia Inquirer says:—Dorrie Fischer, has been where no other live man has ever been or wants to be—in the iron crib and looked in the retort, where dozens of bodies have been burned to nothing plus three pounds of lime smelling ashes. The occasion of this was the trial of the new crib in which the bodies are burned instead of the pan formerly used. It was necessary to try the crib with a body in it. The question came up whose body should be used for the experiment. After gathering plenty of witnesses about to see that Superintendent May-trap could take no mean advantage of the opportunity to roast him alive and kicking, Dorrie Fischer stretched himself out in the crib. He was shoved into the retort. The heavy door was slammed shut. He was in the air-tight coffin with six feet of walls about him, unable to rise. He won't tell what he saw in there, but it is jocularly declared by witnesses that when released he moved a little hurriedly to get out from the crib, felt for his hair and eyebrows to see if they were singed, and then asked for a fan to help reduce his temperature.

His Royal Highness' Big Farm.

The Prince of Wales' home farms at Sandringham now extend over 2,000 acres. There is the Hall dairy farm, on which are fine herds of Jersey and Kerry cattle, and a small flock of South-downs. The Wolferton and Babingley farms have the herd of Shorthorns, the breeding flock of Southdowns, and the studs of hackneys and Shire horses. The Appleton Hall farm, which was formerly tenanted by the authoress of "Eighteen Years on the Sandringham Estate," is given over to less choice stock, i. e., store cattle and sheep. H. R. H. has nearly one hundred hackneys at Wolferton, and about seventy Shire-breds, and there will be a biennial sale from these studs, the first of which is to be held next summer. There are ten brood mares in the thoroughbred stud. Sandringham Park contains a very curious herd of wild, white-horned cattle, which descended from some animals that were sent to the Prince from Hungary by Count Pestetics.
