

An International Cemetery.

There is a man in Denver who has an idea that the country ought to give up the present method of disposing of dead bodies, and adopt one which he suggests. He does not advocate cremation, nor anything else which, so far as is known, appears to have been suggested by any other person. His scheme is to freeze the dead body in water, take the block of ice in which the body has been frozen and carry it to the north, and deposit it on the shores of one of the Arctic seas. He says that he has already made some favorable progress, and that an English syndicate is considering the establishment of an international cemetery on the shores of Baffin's Bay, where, he says, future generations may go to find the faces of their ancestors of the 19th century as natural as life.

Fatal Shooting Accident.

PETERBORO', Sept. 16.—A distressing accident occurred yesterday by which a young lad, a son of Mr. Thos. Howden, butcher, will lose his life. It appears that a number of boys were amusing themselves with a revolver, shooting at a mark on Sandy Point about a mile below the locks about 2.30 yesterday afternoon, when a dispute arose as to who should have the next shot. In the scuffle which followed the revolver was discharged, and the bullet struck young Howden at the base of the nose, half way between the eyes, and entered the brain. As soon as possible the horrified lads carried the news of the accident to people living in the vicinity, and the unfortunate youth was removed to a house near by, where he now lies. Medical aid was promptly summoned, but not the slightest hope is entertained of the lad's recovery.

The Chinese Minister's Wife.

The new Chinese Minister will be accompanied by his wife and family, the first instance wherein a woman of high estate has been permitted to accompany her husband outside of the Celestial Kingdom. The strict surveillance which is there exercised over wives will be followed in this case, for immediately upon the arrival of the new Minister with his family they will drive in a closed carriage to the Legation, where madame will be at once installed in the suite of apartments assigned for her occupancy. With one exception, when the members of the Legation will be formally presented to the mistress of the household a few days after her arrival, she will not at any time see visitors or be seen by company. The Minister will take his wife to dine occasionally, when her health demands such exercise; but, instead of permitting her to take part in any social duties, the Legation will be conducted in all respects as a bachelor establishment.—Washington note.

At Hoboken, N. J., Charles Miguard, a compositor, was bitten on the nose by a mosquito. He rubbed the spot with his hand while it was stung with type lead, which caused blood poisoning, and he died in a few days.

The ship W. H. Starback, which arrived at New York on Saturday from Rio Janeiro, picked up an eagle on the 10th inst. in the Gulf Stream, 150 miles south of Cape Hatteras. The bird was in an exhausted condition, but it soon recovered.

"Aunt" Young died at Louisville, Kentucky, on Friday, at the residence of her brother, Dabney Page, the richest coloured man in that city. She was born in Albermarle county, Virginia, in 1776, and the records of her birth are still in existence.

Miss Chambers, housekeeper for Mr. H. H. O'Reilly, of Owen Sound, while doing some housework on Saturday, fell from a chair against the end of a carpet-sweeper handle, and received injuries which resulted in her death about 2 o'clock on Sunday afternoon.

Some idea of the Shah's travelling expenses may be formed, when it is stated that a cheque for £25,000 has been forwarded to Messrs. Cook, the tourist agents, on behalf of the Persian monarch. The sum comprised expenditure for certain hotel accommodation, as well as for rail and other costs.

Karl Falkenstein is the name of the inventor of smokeless powder. Three years ago he was an unknown chemist in Vienna. He offered his invention to the Austrian War Office, but no investigation of his device was made. Discouraged by this refusal he went to Berlin, and had an interview with the Emperor and Count Walderssee. His invention was thoroughly tested by experts, and the smokeless powder was pronounced a success. He sold his rights to the German Government for a large sum, and is now living in luxury.
