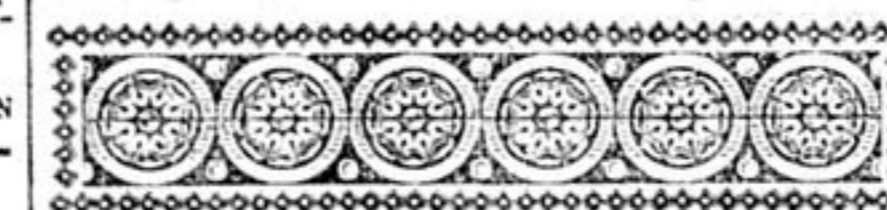

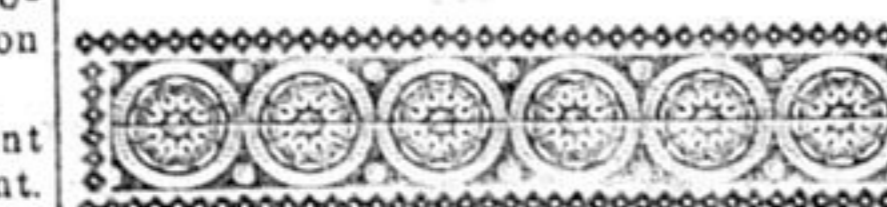

### Village Council.

Fenelon Falls, Oct. 7th, 1889.  
The council met at the call of the reeve. Members present, the reeve and councillors Deyman, Littleton and McDougall. Minutes of the last meeting read and confirmed.

Tenders for the cleaning up of the unsurveyed portion of the cemetery were received as follows: John McGee \$150; Wm. McGee \$140; W. Golden \$100.

Mr. Deyman gives notice that at this meeting of council he will introduce a by-law authorizing the reeve and treasurer to borrow the sum of four hundred dollars.

Moved by Mr. McDougall, seconded by Mr. Deyman. That the following accounts be paid and that the reeve give his orders for the same: John McGee, balance of salary cemetery account, \$7; F. J. Kerr, postage, stationery, &c., \$7.88; Robert Wallace, repairing steps on Queen street, \$1; M. Burley, assistant constable, \$1.50; E. D. Hand, printing up to date, \$12 50.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. McDougall, seconded by Mr. Deyman, That By-law No. —, entitled a by-law to authorize the reeve and treasurer to borrow the sum of four hundred dollars from the Dominion Bank at Lindsay for the term of sixty days, be now introduced and read a first time.—Carried.

By law read a second and third time and passed without amendment.

Moved by Mr. Deyman, seconded by Mr. Littleton, That Wm. Golden's tender of \$100 be accepted, for cutting brush, stumping and grading cemetery.

according to the conditions of an agreement now drawn up by the street and bridge committee.—Carried.

The council then adjourned, to meet at the call of the reeve.
