Robert Jacket was descending from his waggon, he laid his hand on the hind quarters of one of his horses, and. although he spoke at the same time. the animal kicked, striking Mr. Jacket on the leg, and breaking both bones below the knees. Dr. Wilson is in attendance upon the sufferer.

Mr. Gladstone Talks.

AN ADDRESS ON THE CONDITION OF THE WORKING CLASSES.

LONDON, Oct. 28 .- Mr. Gladstone made an address at Chester on Saturday on the condition of the working classes. He contrasted the English workman's position to-day with that of 50 years ago, showing that during the half century there has been an increase of 50 per cent. in wages, while the cheap food and clothing now obtainable are better than heretofore. He urged English workmen to study the history of the American Revolution. He claimed that it was by and from this country that a love of freedom was sown in A merica. England now in return reaped advantages from the American vindication of those principals of freedom which animated the Revolution. The system of government in America combined that love of freedom, respect of law, and desire for order which formed the surest elements of national excell ence and greatness. It was no extravagance to say that, although there were only 2,000,000 of people in the thirteen States at the time of the Revolution, the group of statesmen that proceeded from them were a match for any in the whole history of the world and were superior to those of any one epoch. Their fortunate appearance was undoubtedly due to well-regulated museular freedom.

HOW THE GREAT CYNIC AND EDITOR OF TRUTH LOOKS AND TALKS.

Mr. Labouchere is thus pictured in the New Review : "The smoking-room of the House of Commons is his shrine, and there, poised in an American rocking-chair and delicately toying with a eigarette, he unlocks the varied treasures of his well-stored memory, and enunciates the far-reaching principles of his mild philosophy. He is by no means disposed to be overawed by a great reputation, and is apt to analyze the personal and political qualities of great and good men in the Libe--ral ranks with an agreeable frankness which would probably astonish those strenuous politicians who have already elected him by acclamation to the reversion of the Radical leadership."


