**SHIPMENTS OF CATTLE.**—On Tuesday last Mr. Thomas Bick forwarded a carload of cattle from the Fenelon Falls station to Toronto, and on Wednesday Mr. Henry Austin and Mr. John Copp each sent a carload, the latter also shipping 44 sheep and lambs and a dozen hogs. Mr. Copp says the cattle were the best lot he has purchased, two of the cows weighing 1,200 lbs. each. He has bought fourteen carloads since May, and he expects to be able to ship every fortnight during the winter.
