

British Liberty.

Marvellous advances have been made in recent years in the application and appreciation of the principle of religious toleration. What would have been thought fitting in comparatively recent times is now frowned down by general consent. Mankind is strongly disinclined to persecute for opinion. It is only thirty years since England denied the full rights of citizenship to the Jews, and this has been called to mind by the installation of a Jew, Sir Henry Isaacs, to be Lord Mayor of the chief city of the British Empire. Just seven hundred years ago they were massacred at the coronation of Richard I., the succeeding centuries presenting intermittent outbreaks of official bigotry and popular hatred. Now, all is changed, and the *Jewish Chronicle* remarks apropos of the recent ceremony at the Guildhall:

"The year 1890, in which the greater part of Sir Henry Isaacs's mayoralty will fall, will complete the sixth century which has elapsed since the Jews were hounded out of England, bag and gage. The imagination must be dull indeed that is not stirred by the contrast. Modern justice and morality have triumphed over mediæval bigotry; and the indestructible energy of the Jewish race has renewed its youth. Yesterday reviled and accused, to-day feted and honored by the greatest in the land. Yesterday pariahs, driven out of England with contumely; to-day sitting in the seat of England's rulers, and meting out justice to her people! Let us thank God for it on our knees—us who are reaping the bright harvest which our fathers sowed in tears." The incident has attracted attention in Europe generally, and has called forth testimonies of praise and gratitude to the character of British freedom and its value as an example to all the nations of the earth. The *Austrian Neue Freie Presse* contends that Britain "has attained to the apogee of tolerance and civilization."—*Empire*.

Northwest Notes.

A correspondent at Elmore, Assa., writes:—"Intelligence has been received here that the coal fields are on fire. There was a big loss in the coal fields this summer. In one mine flames burst through into the pit and burned fifty thousand tons of coal which was mined. It is estimated that the fire is 200 feet deep, and it is supposed that it originated from prairie fires. The mines have been on fire for five weeks. It is hoped the Government will turn their attention to the disaster. Tens of thousands of tons are burned monthly." Attempts were made to drive the remainder of the buffalo from Stoney Mountain to the C.P.R. stock yards, but the bulls were fractious as usual, and the undertaking had to be abandoned. Yesterday, however, the brutes were attacked with lassoes and ropes. Three of them were caught and securely tied, and then loaded on sleighs and hauled to the yards. The others will be caught in the same manner.

The Prince as Regent.

Of all the aberrations of the silly season perhaps the most nonsensical is the proposal of a stupid, snobbish contemporary that the Prince of Wales should at once be appointed Regent, because he is in a precarious state of health, and if he were to die the Princess would be left very badly off, whereas if he were made Regent new pecuniary arrangements on a more liberal scale would be granted by Parliament. It is needless to criticise such preposterous rubbish; but I may as well point out that in the unhappy event of the demise of the Prince of Wales, the Princess, so far from being "very badly off," would have a Parliamentary annuity of £30,000 for life, while the Sandringham estate is entirely at the disposal of the Prince; added to which, all the children would be provided for, as, apart from the Parliamentary provision for the younger members of the family, the Duchy of Cornwall estates would at once pass to Prince Albert Victor.—*La-bouchere*.

English artists and English critics are having a quarrel. The artists say that the critics don't understand art, and the critics say that the artists don't understand criticism. They're both right possibly.

There are 20,000 Swedes in Boston, but you wouldn't know it, because they don't herd together, and soon learn to speak English without an accent. They generally Anglicise their names. Of the 30,000 arrests in Boston last year, only 300 were Swedes.
