Municipal Elections.

Although the nominations of candidates for the positions of reeve and councillors will take place on Monday, the 30th inst., and the elections will be held on the Monday following, we hear nothing on the subject beyond a rumor that there are two or three aspirants to the reeveship, and that there is likely to be a lively contest for the other seats at the council board. Mr. John Austin, our present reeve, has been prompt and efficient in the discharge of his duties; but he has been surrounded by difficulties of other men's making, and Mr. Swanton being out of the field and chronic grumblers being numerous, it is not at all improbable that he will be opposed, although we have but little doubt about his re-election. If the councillors have escaped censure for real or supposed sins of commission or omission, they are more fortunate than any of their predecessors; and, as aspirants to office are generally numerous, the majority, if not all, of the present incumbents may safely reckon upon opposition if they seek re-election. As will be seen by the election notices, the nominations are to be held in the evening instead of at noon, as formerly.

The change will meet with general approval, as "wage earners," who could not attend, without loss, in the middle of the day, can all be present if they wish. The change has been made solely for their benefit, and it is to be hoped that they will show their appreciation of it by being present and airing their reins on municipal matters.

Charity Concert.

The charity concert in Ingram's hall on Tuesday evening was well attended, the receipts amounting to within a few cents of \$27, clear of all expenses. Mr. John Austin, reeve of the village, officiated as chairman—with credit to himself and to the satisfaction of all present. The ladies sang admirably, and there is a great diversity of opinion as to which of them has the best voice; but it is generally admitted that Miss Cooper's "Caller Herrin" and Miss Reynolds' "Driven from Home" were vocal gems of the first water. The gentlemen also sang exceedingly well, and won a fair share of applause. The humorous recitation by Mr. McDougall delighted the audience and kept them laughing from beginning to end, and Miss Anderson's pathetic reading moved some of them almost to tears. The charade, by some of the members of the Dramatic Co., was well performed, and the tableau was much admired. Mrs. F. McDougall played all the accompaniments except one or two, when she was relieved by her sister, Mrs. Dr. A. Wilson. The village band was present and assisted in the musical part of the entertainment.
