Sawdust and Fish.

The interview with Mr. Samuel Wilmot on the subject of the injurious effects of sawdust on fish life, which recently appeared in the *Empire*, has evidently attracted a good deal of attention, judging from the publicity which fishing and other papers in the United States have given it. Col. Marshal McDonald, federal commissioner of United States fisheries, writing to the department here, says he read the article with much interest, and he fully concurs with Mr. Wilmot's conclusion. He proposes to publish the interview in a future bulletin to be issued by the commission. In this connection it may be stated that Senator Clemow, on being asked if he intended to take action in regard to the sawdust nuisance at the forthcoming parliamentary session, promptly replied that he would. "I shall move," said he, "for all reports on the matter. When I get further information I shall be able to act. The city council ought to take the matter up, but they are afraid to do it. They think the city is dependent upon lumbermen, and that if they do anything the latter do not approve of the city will suffer. That's all bosh. Even if the lumbermen did leave there would be plenty to take their place and pay a fee. The water power would be very valuable for cotton and wollen mills, which would employ labour."—*Empire*.

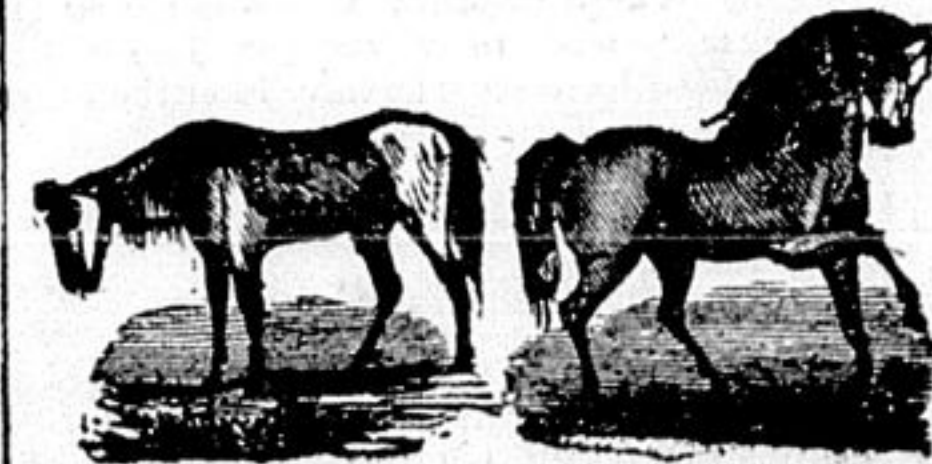
