MECHANIC'S INSTITUTE.—A meeting of the directors of the Mechanics' Institute is to be held on the evening of Thursday next, April 1st, for the purpose of appointing auditors and winding up the business of the year. A numerous attendance is therefore desirable.

EGGS FOR HATCHING.—We direct the attention of poultry fanciers to Mr. D. C. Trew's advertisement in this week's *Gazette*. As all his birds are well bred and his prices moderate, parties in want of the eggs of Houdans, Plymouth Rocks, Black Cochins or White Leghorns need not go farther than Lindsay to get them.

ANOTHER STEAMER.—In a workshop erected for the purpose near the foundry, Mr. Wm. McClellan is superintending the construction of a neat little steamer; the ship carpenters being Mr. George Littleton of the Falls and Mr. Fred Ellis of Sturgeon Point. The new boat is to be 35 feet long by 7 feet wide and she is to be built almost entirely of oak and elm. The keel was laid on or about the 12th inst., and it is expected that she will be finished by the opening of navigation. The 6 h. p. engine that is to drive her is on the ground ready to be put in as soon as she is ready to receive it. Mr. McClellan has been a sailor nearly all his life, and he will soon be in a position to spend his leisure hours in what may almost be called his native element.

Canada is All Right.

The report of the Ways and Means Committee of the American Congress increasing the duties almost to the prohibiting point on Canadian products has not filled the Government at Ottawa with alarm or even ruffled its way, the belief being general that the trade lost with the States through the tariff will be made up in another direction. There is always a demand for barley in England, and it is expected that Canada will furnish a good sample of the two-rowed variety, with the seed of which farmers are being supplied by the Government. There is also a constant demand in England for dairy products, for horses and cattle which Canada can supply. There is a movement afoot to enlarge Canada's trade with the West India Islands, where fish, flour and lumber meet with ready sale. At present lumber companies on the Georgian Bay ship large quantities of lumber to Tonawanda, near Buffalo, whence it is shipped to South America. Shut out of the States, what is to prevent Canadian lumbermen from dealing directly with South Americans and saving the profit which at present goes to the middle men? There is nothing helps an energetic man so much as to teach him that he must depend entirely upon himself for success, and nothing so weakens him as dependence. The same may be said of nations. Those that are industrious and self-reliant are the most successful. Canada is too great, too prosperous and too enterprising a country to be retarded by any unneighborly acts of the Americans, who themselves would be the losers in the long run by the cessation of intercourse between the two peoples. If they put their tariff up they will be elad to take it down again after a little experience of it. They are seeking far and wide for outlets for their stagnating industries, and have not been able to find any; but the Canadians will be compelled to seek other channels, and their energy is such as to warrant any one in believing that they will find them, and advantageous ones, too.—*Toronto News*.
